STOPPING SEX TRAFFICKING IN THE HOSPITALITY INDUSTRY

WHAT'S GOING ON?

Alcohol service permittees are required to report suspected sex trafficking to law enforcement and to OLCC starting January 1, 2022. This requirement applies to bars or restaurants that hold either a full-on premises sales license or a limited on premises sales license.

WHAT IS SEX TRAFFICKING AND WHAT TO LOOK FOR?

Sex trafficking occurs when individuals are made to perform sexual activity through the use of force, fraud, or coercion. Any child under 18 who is involved in sex-for-hire is a victim of trafficking in the eyes of the law.

If the situation is an emergency or you believe someone is in immediate danger, you should first call 911 to alert law enforcement that you've observed potential sex trafficking.

You can also report the alleged sex trafficking directly to your local OLCC Inspector.

WHAT HAPPENS IF A SERVICE PERMITTEE FAILS TO REPORT?

The OLCC may revoke or suspend a service permit, or impose a civil penalty if the commission finds that a permittee was aware of sex trafficking and did not report it.
