- **SAMHSA Accepting Applications for Grants to Help People Transition from the Criminal Justice System to Community** The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) is accepting applications for fiscal year (FY) 2010 for Offender Reentry Program grants. The purpose of this program is to expand and/or enhance substance abuse treatment and related recovery and reentry services to sentenced juvenile and adult offenders returning to the community from incarceration for criminal and juvenile offenses.

- **\$120 Million in Prevention and Wellness Awards Now Available from CDC** U.S. states and territories may apply for a share of \$210 million in prevention and wellness cooperative agreements that will be awarded by the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.
- **SAMHSA Funds Training in Brief Intervention** Six cooperative agreements totaling \$11 million have been inked between the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) and medical schools to train medical residents on screening, brief intervention and treatment (SBIRT) for addiction disorders.
- **Addiction Treatment Programs for HIV-Positive Populations Awarded \$33 Million** The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) has awarded more than \$33 million to provide coordinated addiction treatment and HIV/AIDS services to programs that target traditionally underserved communities, including African American, Latino/Hispanic and/or other racial and ethnic minority communities disproportionately affected by addiction and HIV/AIDS.
- **Residential Treatment Programs for Women Receive \$14.7 Million in Grants** Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) has awarded \$14.7 million in grants under its Residential Treatment of Pregnant and Postpartum Women (PPW) with Substance Abuse Problems program.
- **Jail Diversion Programs for Veterans Funded** Programs that seek to keep veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress and related disorders out of prison have been awarded a total of \$10 million in grants.

- **Treatment Research Grants for Marijuana Medications**  
Researchers working to develop medications to treat marijuana-related disorders may apply for \$3 million in funding from the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA).
- **State Recovery Act Grants for Tobacco Control, Other Priorities**  
U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) will award a total of \$125 million to states in supplemental funding for the Healthy Communities program, focusing on three priority areas: tobacco control, behavioral risk factor surveillance systems, and diabetes control and prevention. The money comes from the federal Recovery Act of 2008.
- **\$43 Million in Treatment Funding for Homeless Awarded**  
Twenty-five grants totaling \$43 million over five years have been awarded to groups that provide addiction and mental health treatment to homeless populations.
- **Adult Drug Treatment Courts Funded**  
Adult drug treatment courts in 44 communities nationally will be expanded thanks to \$38.2 million in grants recently awarded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).
- **Grants Will Promote Integration of Behavioral Health and Primary Care Systems**  
Programs that seek to better integrate behavioral healthcare and primary healthcare systems will receive a total of \$25.9 million in grants from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).
- **DWI Training Scholarships Deadline Extended**  
Currently operating drug courts have a little more time to apply for scholarships that offset some of the costs of attending the National Center for DWI Courts (NCDC) DWI Court Training Programs.
- **Programs Combining Soccer, Anti-Drug Programming Can Apply for Grants**  
The United States Soccer Foundation's 2010 Program and Field Grants provides funding, equipment, and services for soccer programs in the U.S., and is particularly interested in funding organizations that incorporate a youth-development elements such as anti-violence, drug prevention, and healthy lifestyles into their programs.
- **FY2010 AmeriCorps State and National Grants**  
The Corporation for National and Community Service has announced that it is accepting applications for the FY2010 AmeriCorps State and National Grants.
- **Canada: 2010 National Awards for Excellence**  
The Kaiser Foundation is now accepting nominations for its 2010 National Awards for Excellence, which recognize Canadian addiction and mental-health related programs and advocacy in six distinct categories.
- **MA: Youth and Family Grants from John Hancock**  
John Hancock Financial Services will award grants to Massachusetts community-based groups that serve needy youths and families in Boston.
- **Funding Available for Local Recovery-Oriented Systems of Care**  
Applications are now being accepted for FY2010 funding under the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) grant program supporting the development and use of local recovery-oriented systems of care.
- **Offender Reentry Program Grants**  
Nonprofits, government agencies and others may apply for a share of \$39.6 million in funding for programs that provide addiction services as part of efforts to help criminal offenders reenter into society.
- **Do Something Awards Honor Young Activists**  
Social-change activists in the U.S. and Canada under age 25 may be nominated for the Do Something Awards, established to honor young "world changers."

- **SAMHSA Grants Support Transitional Service for Addicted Offenders**  
Programs that help people with addictions make the transition from prison back to the community and continue their recovery have been awarded a total of \$28.7 million.
- **Grants Fund Addiction and HIV/AIDS Prevention**  
Five community-based programs that seek to prevent addiction and HIV/AIDS in at-risk, traditionally underserved populations have been awarded a total of \$8.2 million in grants by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).
- **Wisc. Alcohol Taxes Get Mixed Reception**  
Proposals to raise beer and liquor taxes in Wisconsin -- partly to pay for alcohol treatment and anti-drunk-driving programs -- drew big crowds to the state capital, but the response from lawmakers was less than enthusiastic.
- **\$13.5 Million Awarded for Treatment Capacity Expansion**  
The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) has awarded \$15.3 million in grants for expanding addiction treatment capacity "in communities that can most benefit from these types of integrated comprehensive services," the agency announced.
- **Juvenile Drug Courts Get \$2.4 Million from SAMHSA**  
Grants totaling \$2.4 million have been awarded to a trio of programs that will use the money to expand the addiction treatment capacity of juvenile drug courts.
- **\$3.7 Million Awarded to Expand 'Reclaiming Futures'**  
Three more juvenile drug courts will implement the Reclaiming Futures intervention and treatment model thanks to new grants from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) and the U.S. Department of Justice's Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP).
- **Aerosmith Singer Booked for Treatment Benefit Gig**  
Aerosmith singer Steven Tyler has agreed to do a solo benefit performance on Jan. 23 in Concord, N.H., to benefit addiction treatment and child-abuse prevention programs.

### **New Funding Opportunities**

- **\$650 Million Community Prevention and Wellness Initiative Funded Under Recovery Act** Programs aimed at cutting smoking and obesity and improving nutrition and physical activity will be among the beneficiaries of a \$650-million prevention and wellness initiative funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.
- **NIDA Announces 2009 Avant-Garde Awards for Innovative HIV/AIDS Research** The National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) has chosen four researchers to receive its 2009 Avant-Garde Awards for HIV/AIDS research on prevention and treatment among illicit-drug users.
- **Pa. Treatment Providers, Others Sue State Over Budget Cuts** A group of Pennsylvania human-services organizations has sued Gov. Ed Rendell over his veto of \$12.9 billion in state spending, claiming the cuts represented an unconstitutional and illegal "withholding" of state and federal funds.
- **Boston Foundation Revamps Grantmaking** The Boston Foundation says it will shift its grantmaking from programmatic grants to general operating support for local nonprofits.
- **California Guts Funding for Prison Treatment** The California Department of Corrections is cutting \$250 million in funding for prison-based rehabilitation programs, including those that provide addiction-treatment and academic services.

### **New Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA)**

- **Apply for CDC's Communities Putting Prevention to Work Grants** The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) announced the release of \$373 million from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 to fund the first part of a new \$650 million public health initiative, Communities Putting Prevention to Work. This initiative will put money into the hands of communities, states, and territories with the goals of reducing risk factors for chronic diseases and promoting wellness.
