1. Percent of screen positive newborns who received timely follow up to definitive diagnosis and clinical management for condition(s) mandated by their State-sponsored newborn screening programs.
2. Percent of children with special health care needs 0 to 18 whose families partner in decision making at all levels and are satisfied with the services they receive.
3. Percent of children with special health care needs age 0 - 18 who receive coordinated, ongoing, comprehensive care within a medical home.
4. Percent of children with special health care needs age 0 - 18 whose families have adequate private and/or public insurance to pay for the services they need.
5. Percent of children with special health care needs age 0 - 18 whose families report the community based service systems are organized so they can use them easily.
6. Percent of youth with special health care needs who received the services necessary to make transition to all aspects of adult life, including adult health services, work, and independence.
7. Percent of 19 to 35 month olds received full schedule of age appropriate immunizations for Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Polio, Diptheria, Tetanus, Pertussis, Haemophilus Influenza, and Hepatitis B (4:3:1:3:3).
8. Rate of birth (per 1000) for teenagers aged 15 through 17 years.
9. Percent of third grade children who have received protective sealants on at least one permanent molar.
10. Rate of deaths to children aged 14 years and younger caused by motor vehicle crashes per 100,000 children.
11. Percent of mothers who breastfeed their infants at 6 months of age.
12. Percent of newborns that have been screened for hearing before hospital discharge.
13. Percent of children without health insurance.
14. Percent of children, ages 2 to 5 years, receiving WIC services with a Body Mass Index (BMI) at or above the 85th percentile.
15. Percent of women who smoke in the last three months of pregnancy.
16. Rate (per 100,000) of suicide deaths among youth aged 15 through 19.
17. Percent of very low birth weight infants delivered at facilities for high-risk deliveries and neonates
18. Percent of infants born to pregnant women receiving prenatal care beginning in the first trimester

8. Percent of health care providers who report confidence in caring for CYSHN and their families
