OSPTR Primary Prevention allocations

\$13.706 million for primary prevention of substance use disorder

- **\$9.5 million** to primary prevention capacity and workforce in counties
 - 15/21 non-LPHA agreements executed so far!
- \$450,000 to support the Oregon Coalition of Prevention Professionals/Oregon Council for Behavioral Health to train and certify 100 Certified Prevention Specialists in two years
 - Agreement in progress; executed by 10/30
- **\$3.8 million** to increase community and culturallylinguistically specific/responsive capacity for primary prevention
 - \$1.28 million to RHECs January 1 project start date
 - \$2.48 million to CBOs: PHOCUS grant opportunity

PHOCUS grants: Promoting Healthy Outcomes with Culturally Unique Solutions

OSPTRB prevention allocation of \$2.48 million

Up to 15 CBOs will be funded

Funding amounts will range from \$100,000- \$200,000

Projects will begin January 1, 2025, and end by June 30, 2027* (There is no obligation to propose a 30-month project; projects can be shorter as needed)

OHA will collaborate with successful applicants on program planning and will provide technical assistance throughout the project period

PHOCUS goals

Implement culturally and linguistically specific strategies to prevent the initiation of substance use and substance use disorder

Build community-based strategies, partnerships, and programming to reduce and prevent initiation of substance use and substance use disorder in communities disproportionately impacted by harms related to opioids and other drugs

Reduce or prevent substance use/substance use disorder among priority populations:

- 1. Black, African, Pan-African, African American or Foundational Black American (FBA) persons
- 2. American Indian or Alaska Native persons
- 3. People who speak languages other than English

Required strategies

Engage Strategy 1: Engage programs and community to understand the array of substance use and substance use disorder prevention challenges that are most concerning to at least one of the PHOCUS priority populations


