Executive Summary

As required by law, this implementation status report is produced by the Wildfire Programs Director every two months for the Governor, the Presiding Officers of the Oregon Legislature, and the chairs of relevant legislative committees.

Wildfire Program Highlights

1. The Wildfire Programs are guided by the 19member citizen council: Wildfire Programs Advisory Council. One of the WPAC's responsibilities is to submit an annual report to the Legislature and the Governor; please see the 2024 report here: Wildfire Programs Advisory Council Annual Report | October 2024. The WPAC has once again done a nice job summarizing their work in a consumable executive summary. The body of the report is robust and focuses in three areas: 1) community risk reduction, 2) landscape resiliency, and 3) adequate funding for mitigation and response.

2. 2024 also marks the first rotation of the WPAC's membership. Following the submission of the annual report, the Presiding Officers appointed the first rotation of new members and those selected for a 2nd term <u>Joint Appointment -</u> <u>Wildfire Programs Advisory Council 2024</u>. Four members are returning for a 2nd term, while five new members will be welcomed to the WPAC in January at the first quarterly meeting of the year.

3. The Oregon Department of Forestry and Oregon State Fire Marshal were tasked by the Legislature through House Bill 5701 (2024) to convene a workgroup to identify solutions for sustainable wildfire mitigation and suppression funding to address the growing wildfire crisis. The workgroup will continue to meet through January to inform a progress report for legislative consideration during the 2025 session. Highlighting the critical and urgent need for durable wildfire funding solutions for the state, Governor Kotek announced on November 26 that she is using her constitutional authority to call a special session of the Oregon Legislature to begin




on Thursday, December 12, for lawmakers to appropriate funds to pay for the 2024 wildfire season.

4. The hazard map remains the final significant milestone to complete the initial workload from the passage of SB 762 (2021). Due to the requirements in law to process appeals as "contested case hearings," we have delayed the release of the state's hazard map because of logistics needed for mass printings and certified mailings. The mailings to properties in high hazard and in the Wildland Urban Interface as identified in the map, will begin on January 1, 2025. The WPAC has reviewed the mailings, as required by law, and the agencies are completing their due diligence by providing the appropriate information for citizens regarding contested case hearings, along with educational materials on defensible space, home hardening, insurance and the map itself.

5. A few other Wildfire Program highlights for this biennium's implementation include: The State's 20-Year Landscape Resiliency Plan continues to focus on reducing catastrophic wildfire fuels across all lands. OSFM's Community Risk Reduction Program has made great strides completing 2600 defensible space assessments, which may include eligibility to receive a \$250 payment to protect homes <u>Oregon Defensible</u> Space. The Oregon Conservation Corps continues to employ youth through workforce development partnerships to reduce hazardous fuels across 3,800 acres and over 500 homes and businesses, reducing the threat of wildfire in Oregon.

Duties of the Wildfire Programs Director

- Oversee implementation of the Wildfire Programs.
- Coordinate activities across all wildfire implementation agencies.
- Ensure compliance with deadlines.
- Monitor and assess the equity of any financial impacts from implementation activities on local jurisdictions.
- Supervise council staff and develop director reports every two months.
- Explore current and future opportunities to reduce wildfire risk.



Roles of the Wildfire Programs Advisory Council

- Advise and assist the Wildfire Programs Director.
- Monitor Wildfire Programs implementation and evaluate agency reports.
- Advise on changes necessary to dramatically reduce wildfire risk and ensure regional defensible space, building codes and land use applications are appropriate.
- Strengthen intergovernmental and multiparty collaboration including government, stakeholders and the public.
- Assess how Oregon's wildfire risk map may inform building codes and land use laws, rules and decisions in a regionally appropriate manner.
- Assess the application of defensible space requirements to vineyards, crops and other cultivated vegetation.
- Review the findings and recommendations in the DLCD's October 2022 report and make additional recommendations to land use planning, local comprehensive plans, and zoning codes to minimize wildfire risk.
- Report every October to the Governor and appropriate committees or interim committees of the Oregon Legislative Assembly.
