Summary description of project

Wildfire-evacuation research is in its infancy amidst a surge in extreme wildfire and timely need for comprehensive planning to protect our community. Wildfire evacuation facility planning is an essential resilience effort for life safety. This project will use cutting-edge modeling for the Wildfire Evacuation Assessment to identify infrastructure evacuation improvements in Benton County. It also seeks to prioritize routes that can leverage recreational & Transportation Options (TO) opportunities as well as connect to Lincoln, Linn, and Lane evacuation systems, thereby completing the regional system. The assessment will; 1) Assess risk/vulnerability of the County's transportation infrastructure; 2) Analyze existing evacuation facilities & improvement needs; 3) identify/evaluate/prioritize needed facility improvements including right-of-way dedication; 4) Prioritize options that leverage said uses; and 5) Identify financing options to implement in existing CIP & NHMP.

What is the transportation or transportation-related land use issue, problem, need, or opportunity the proposed project will address?

The Benton County Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP, 2009, 2016). lacks an essential land use resilience assessment as road improvement projects have not been analyzed for potential life safety impact/emergency response to natural disasters. CWPP 2023 removed roadway improvement projects with the intent of conducting a comprehensive assessment of roadway, ROW, and trail interconnectivity with a quantitative lens on evacuation routes using cutting edge transportation modeling.

Strategy 1.2.1a. Complete a county-wide evacuation assessment to identify existing and needed critical transportation routes (needed to allow emergency access to all locations within the county and allow evacuation of residents).

Strategy 1.2.1b. Evaluate the critical transportation routes identified through 1.2.1a for inadequacies (e.g., connectivity/alternative routes, road width, turnouts, turnarounds); prioritize infrastructure improvements and develop funding-ready project descriptions for high priority projects; seek funding.

This assessment will identify needed roadway interconnections within the county and between adjacent counties and prioritize the projects. Benton County contains constrained communities, defined by the county as a grouping of more than 20 parcels/lots with only one connection to the county roadway network. These communities were created prior to the adoption of Benton County development code road design standards that now require subdivisions that contain more than 20 residential parcels/lots to create multiple points of access or cul-de-sacs that serve more than 20 residential lots/parcels to provide a secondary means of access for emergency use. The limitation of only one connection to the roadway network is an impediment to rapid evacuation and emergency response and engenders unsafe, life-threatening situations.

Not only are interconnections needed but other critical evacuation routes need to be identified and a set of strategies and treatments identified for improving the capacity and resilience of the county's roadway network to support potential evacuation events. This evaluation for wildfire emergency evacuation needs will also suffice to increase evacuation options and emergency access for other hazards such as flooding, landslides, and earthquakes. As an additional benefit, evacuation facility improvements will integrate into the recreation network. Facilities that will provide safe evacuation routes will also provide year-round opportunities for walking, biking, and hiking. Integrating recreation opportunities into the evacuation network increases community familiarity with evacuation routes.

What are the proposed Project Objectives? How will the Project Objectives achieve one or more of the TGM Objectives?

The project objectives capture the intent of the project and reflect the critical role of evacuation facilities as part of the transportation system most immediately able to assist residents at risk in the event of a wildfire. The following are project goals:

SAFETY - Reduce risk to the community from a wildfire event by increasing convenient and accessible evacuation routes that connect at-risk communities to safe areas. At-risk communities are those communities identified as constrained.

CONNECTIONS - Expand the connected network of hardened evacuation facilities that can also provide year-round recreation benefits.

EQUITY - Reduce transportation-related disparities and barriers for communities at risk.

COLLABORATION - Continue cooperation and collaboration among adjacent counties and cities to implement and maintain a coordinated evacuation route network.

Project objectives will serve to achieve all of the TGM objectives.

1) Provide transportation choices. This evacuation assessment will identify and prioritize needed facilities and improvements to the transportation system for safe and integrated evacuation of community members during a wildfire event. Lifeline routes and alternative routes will also be identified, which will provide access to and from the area for the transport of goods and services post-event. Prior to the event, the community can use the evacuation facilities as bike and pedestrian routes.

2) Create communities. This project will create more livable communities by planning for and prioritizing an evacuation facility system that enables community members to better escape wildfires, and other natural disasters, in a timely manner. These routes can also connect with identified evacuation routes in adjacent counties.

3) Support economic vitality. A well-planned evacuation system should remain functional after a wildfire. This bolsters the transport of goods and services after the event and enables faster recovery of the economy. Use of the additional evacuation systems outside of wildfire evacuation needs will also enhance the desirability of those neighborhoods for residential development and redevelopment.

4) Save public and private costs. Development can continue to occur consistent with the current zoning as long as safe evacuation routes are planned and developed. The need for an integrated wildfire evacuation facilities system is immediate since we do not know when an out-of-control wildfire will occur, but the odds increase each year. The facilities planned for wildfire evacuation will fulfill multiple objectives and serve multiple transportation modes.

5) Promote environmental stewardship. Given that the majority of the facilities will be used as bike and pedestrian routes, the plan will promote energy efficiency and reduce air pollution and greenhouse gasses.

Why is it important to do the proposed project in this grant cycle?

This 2024 fire season shows why it is so important to do the proposed project in this grant cycle. Lightning strikes are occurring in Benton County as they are across the state. With the increase in summer temperatures and winds creating almost constant red flag conditions, Benton County has been trending toward vulnerability to several areas of current high risk. The community members want this assessment done now so that the county can incorporate evacuation facility improvements into the Transporation System Plan (TSP) and begin to schedule funding. Moreover, adject counties have completed or are near completion in their respective efforts. Without connectivity to the region, Benton County is a choke point for regional evacuation needs.

The County adopted a new Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP) and updated the Natural Hazards and Mitigation Plan (NHMP) in 2023. Within the CWPP, the county committed to become a Fire Adapted Community, as shown in the approved vision, "For the County's populace to be wildfire aware and prepared for fire emergencies and for all properties to be adapted to local wildfire risk." The county also prioritized this assessment by identifying the following strategies under this policy, "Improve evacuation and emergency access routes," as two of the top five projects to get immediately implemented. These were also incorporated as policies in the updated NHMP.

1.2.1a Complete a county-wide evacuation assessment to identify existing and needed critical transportation routes (needed to allow emergency access to all locations within the county and allow evacuation of residents)

1.2.1b Evaluate the critical transportation routes identified through 1.2.1a for inadequacies (e.g., connectivity/alternative routes, road width, turnouts, turnarounds); prioritize infrastructure improvements and develop funding-ready project descriptions for high priority projects; seek funding

In addition, this assessment project will achieve recommendation #2 within the 2022 DLCD Wildfire Adapted Communities Recommendations Report that states, "Cities and counties assess and improve transportation networks for safe evacuation and firefighting response."

The local actions needed to move this project forward have already been accomplished. The project has been identified as a priority in the CWPP and the NHMP. The Benton County Board of County Commissioners has encouraged pursuit of this grant. A public sector consultant who is well experienced in creating natural hazard plans and who has developed specialized technology is available partner on this project. Experienced internal project manager has been identified. Support staff has been identified. Michael Howard with the University of Oregon (UoO) is a co-applicant and will be the consultant on the project.

This project ties into several ongoing initiatives and projects. The CWPP revision and the NHMP update were previously mentioned. Benton County has also embarked on Voluntary Periodic Review. Currently, the Development Code is undergoing a comprehensive audit as a precursor to a complete retool when policy decisions derived from the current Comprehensive Plan update begin to take shape. A reoccurring top-tier priority for the community in our preliminary public outreach to the rural community has been public safety, emergency response and access concerns. The County is also pursuing options to update the county-wide Trails and Multimodal Transportation System Plan of which evacuation planning elements will have a critical role in prioritizing, funding, and implementing multi-purpose infrastructure. There are adjacent county projects such as the 'Hwy 99 Spine' Multimodal project lead by Lane County & ODOT; a top regional TO priority to connect to Benton County.

WHEREAS, the Evacuation Route Assessment project is one of five top priority strategies listed in the 2023-2028 Community Wildfire Protection Plan and is consistent with the goals of the TGM program and a priority; and

Benton County can locally match the funding to fulfill its 11.5% share of obligation related to this grant application, which includes in-kind-eligible match, should the grant funds be awarded; and

Benton County will adopt the Evacuation Route Assessment as an appendix to the Comprehensive Plan, and the Emergency Operations Center will utilize the Assessment to plan ways to support evacuation events, and the Public Works Department will utilize the Assessment to schedule improvements to the road network to support better evacuation strategies.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that:

I am writing letter in support of the Evacuation Assessment Report that Benton County is submitting for grant funding through the Transportation Growth Management Program. The County is submitting for an Integrated Land Use and Transportation Planning grant to support an evaluation of roadway capacity constraints on county communities that are vulnerable to wildfires and identification of future improvement possibilities. When completed, the Evacuation Assessment Report will satisfy two top priority strategies identified in the 2023-2028 Community Wildfire Protection Plan to support safety within Benton County.

We believe that this grant proposal addresses a pressing local transportation and land use issue – how to provide safe evacuation in the event a wildfire threatens Benton County communities. It is acknowledged that wildfire threats are increasing and that the threat is advancing into areas normally deemed of low to medium wildfire hazard. For example, Benton County had a very unusual lightning strike in Kings Valley in August 2023, an area of low hazard, that started a fire. Another fire, of unknown origin, was started in Soap Creek Valley, also an area of low hazard. Luckily both fires were found quickly and suppressed by the local Fire Districts.

By completing this assessment, the county will be able to incorporate transportation projects into the Transportation Systems Plan confident that the investment will provide interconnectivity for safer, more accessible, and more vibrant communities.

As an example, in May 2023, one neighborhood collaborated with Oregon State University to apply to the Planning Commission for a conditional use permit for an emergency evacuation route through the OSU research sheep farm. We welcomed the active participation of Oregon State and approved the application.

By completing the proposed Evacuation Assessment Report, the County will be able to incorporate transportation projects into the Transportation Systems Plan confident that the investment will provide interconnectivity for safer, more accessible, and more vibrant communities.

I am writing this letter in support of the Evacuation Assessment Report that Benton County is submitting for grant funding through the Transportation Growth Management Program. The County is submitting for an Integrated Land Use and Transportation Planning grant to support an evaluation of roadway capacity constraints on county communities that are vulnerable to wildfires and identification of future improvement possibilities. When completed, the Evacuation Assessment Report will satisfy two top priority strategies identified in the 2023-2028 Community Wildfire Protection Plan to support safety within Benton County.

The Chinook Road District (CRD) comprises approximately five miles of road and includes about 500 acres with approximately 75 residential structures. The CRD has only one road entry and exit (via Oak Creek). In addition, the CRD provides the main access entry to the Fitton Green County Natural Area, the Crestmont Farm trails, and an access point to Bald Hill Park. Usage of these areas has increased tremendously over the last few years resulting in unsafe conditions, especially during fire season. To gain access to these parks and access points, vehicles must travel the CRD roadways, often resulting in hundreds of cars/day. The use is particularly high during the summer months. We believe that this grant proposal addresses a pressing local transportation and land use issue – how to provide safe evacuation in the event a wildfire threatens Benton County communities. It is acknowledged that wildfire threats are increasing and that the threat is advancing into areas normally deemed of low to medium wildfire hazard. For example, Benton County had a very unusual lightning strike in Kings Valley in August 2023, an area of low hazard, that started a fire. Another fire, of unknown origin, was started in Soap Creek Valley, also an area of low hazard. Luckily both fires were found quickly and suppressed by the local Fire Districts.

By completing this assessment, the county will be able to incorporate transportation projects into the Transportation Systems Plan confident that the investment will provide interconnectivity for safer, more accessible, and more vibrant communities.

The Benton Soil and Water Conservation District would like to voice strong support for the Benton County application to the Transportation and Growth Management Program. The focus of the proposal is to assess evacuation routes in Benton County during emergency events.

Benton County has shown great leadership in emergency management over the years, including some very recent actions. On May 18 of this year, the county held an emergency drill where residents practiced evacuating their properties and met at specified locations. We have also appreciated, and advocated for, the work that the county has done with Oregon Department of Forestry and others in the Oak Creek Watershed to determine additional evacuation routes for members of Firewise Communities located in that area.

At Benton SWCD, we talk to farmers, woodland owners, and other residents about fire safety and actions they can take to reduce fuels around their homes. These actions include removing vegetation within 30 feet of the home, clearing gutters of organic debris, choosing fire safe building products, and many other concepts. Committing to these actions is very important to lower risk, but all residents still have potential to face wildfire in the vicinity of their homes, so evacuation plans are critical. In the last decade we have seen several fires in Western Oregon that show us that the threat in our area is very real.

While Benton County residents continue to gain more education related to wildfire safety, it's critical that the County continue to provide the infrastructure to keep people safe. Please give Benton County full consideration for their efforts to create an Evacuation Assessment Report under this grant opportunity. They have a great track record in implementing this work.
