Summary description of project

Rainier's current Transportation System Plan was adopted in 1997 and is in need of updating. The City has been awarded a grant to fund the work to facilitate the process for a potential urban growth boundary land swap. Such a land swap would have an effect on the city's transportation systems and traffic patterns. An updated TSP reflecting those changes would better help the city with its long-term transportation system planning efforts.

The application demonstrates the proposed project clearly and effectively addresses a local or regional transportation or transportation-related land use issue, problem, need, or opportunity and will achieve one or more of the TGM Objectives.

What is the transportation or transportation-related land use issue, problem, need, or opportunity the proposed project will address?

Rainier's current Transportation System Plan is based on its existing Urban Growth Boundary, which has remained largely unchanged since its initial establishment. However, that UGB includes many geographic constraints that have helped hamper the city's growth and development. The City has been awarded a grant to fund the facilitation of a potential UGB land swap and is starting that process. If a UGB land swap takes place, the City will need an updated TSP to reflect any of those changes and their impacts on traffic patterns and its overall transportation system. This will better enable the City to conduct long-term planning for future growth and development.

What are the proposed Project Objectives? How will the Project Objectives achieve one or more of the TGM Objectives?

The primary objective is to have a TSP that will be in alignment with the adjusted Urban Growth Boundary that could result from the land swap process that is already being conducted by the City. Another is to have a TSP that will enable the City to have adequate transportation capacity for any future growth and to plan for any potential multimodal transportation opportunities that may arise.

Updating the City's TSP in tandem with an adjusted Urban Growth Boundary would better enable timely alignment of those documents and facilitate better planning of transportation and other infrastructure to meet future growth needs.

A series of public hearings will be held in the second half of 2024 at the City's Planning Commission and Council meetings regarding the potential UGB land swap. A similar set of hearings will take place at the county level as part of that same process.

A buildable lands inventory is being conducted as part of the UGB land swap process to determine how many acres within the current UGB can be considered constrained. That is being followed by an alternatives analysis to determine the areas surrounding the existing city limits that would be most suitable for future growth. An updated TSP would complement these efforts by providing clear direction on necessary improvements to transportation infrastructure and systems.

An Updated TSP will be provided by the consultant, based on input from the community through a series of hearings and public meetings of the City's Planning Commission and Council. That updated TSP will then be adopted by the Council and used by the City for future planning decisions.

How will the project approach support investment decisions for Safe Systems, Climate Action, and Equitable Outcomes?

The City's current TSP does not address safety in areas outside of its Urban Growth Boundary that may end up incorporated into the UGB as part of the land swap process. An updated TSP could also be used to identify projects to enhance and create opportunities for multimodal transportation, such as bike paths and pedestrian trails for more connectivity.

The City would take the same approach that other cities such as Gresham and Milwaukie have taken with their recent TSP updates. A critical component will be outreach to the residents of the adjusted UGB area to obtain their input on desired transportation system improvements.

The Commission will begin the UGB land swap process in the fall of 2024, at which point it will go to the Council. A parallel process will occur with the Columbia County Planning Commission and Board of Commissioners. City staff will then work closely with the Planning Commission to implement the Transportation System Plan update before its adoption before the City Council.

How will the adoption of the final document(s) address barriers to a broad range of housing types and affordability or work to link the location of future workforce housing to walkable/bikeable areas with good transit?

The single largest barrier to housing in Rainier right now is a lack of buildable land. The buildable lands inventory that has already been conducted as part of the UGB land swap process has identified 400 acres within the City and its UGB that are constrained and unbuildable. Swapping those lands out for land that is more developable will open the City up for many more housing opportunities. Once the City has adjusted its UGB, it will be critical to identify and plan for future transportation needs based on those changes.

Mayor Jerry Cole called the council meeting to order at 5:34 p.m.

Council Present: Scott Cooper, Robert duPlessis, Paul Langner and Denise Watson

Council Absent: Connie Budge, Jeremy Howell and Mike Kreger

City Attorney Present: No

City Staff Present: Gregg Griffith, Police Chief; W. Scott Jorgensen, City Administrator; Russ Reigel, Public Works Director

Flag Salute

Mayor's Address: Mayor Jerry Cole said that Rainier Days was scheduled to take place July 12-14. The summer concert in the parks series is going well and the organizer is interested in doing a farmer's market.

Additions/Deletions from the Agenda: City Administrator W. Scott Jorgensen requested that TGM grant authorization be added to the agenda. Councilor Paul Langner moved to add that item to the agenda. That motion was seconded by Councilor Scott Cooper and adopted unanimously. Langner moved that the second reading of Ordinance 1099 be deleted from the agenda and the formation of a committee to discuss it be added to the agenda. That motion was seconded by Cooper and adopted unanimously.

Visitor Comments: There were no visitor comments at this time.

Approval of the Consent Agenda

Consider Approval of the June 3, 2024 Regular Council Meeting Minutes and Financial Statements—Cooper moved to approve the consent agenda. That motion was seconded by Langner and adopted unanimously.

New Business

- a. Award Bid for City Hall Gutter Replacement—Public Works Director Russ Reigel said he received a bid for \$14,461 for city hall and \$5,267 for the water plant and recommends moving forward with it. Cooper moved to approve the bid. That motion was seconded by Langner and adopted unanimously.
- b. Award Contract for Sanitary System Services—Councilor Robert duPlessis moved to approve the contract. That motion was seconded by Councilor Denise Watson and adopted unanimously.
- c. Resolution 24-06-02—Authorizing Interfund Loan Not to Exceed \$130,000 from the Timber Fund to the Special Projects Fund for City Hall Window Restoration—Cooper moved to approve the resolution. That motion was seconded by Langner and adopted unanimously.

- d. TGM Grant Authorization—duPlessis moved to authorize Jorgensen to apply for the grant. That motion was seconded by Langner and adopted unanimously.
- e. Ordinance 1099 Committee—Cooper moved to form a committee to study the lateral connection issue consisting of himself, Jorgensen, Reigel, Langner, Al Guist, Ron Roche and duPlessis, with Watson as an alternate if duPlessis is unavailable. That motion was seconded by Langer and adopted unanimously.

Unfinished Business

- a. Hudson Garbage Rate Request—Cooper said he met with representatives of Hudson to obtain more information. Hudson has an on-call option, in which customers can have garbage picked up at their convenience rather than weekly or monthly. Hudson District Manager Josh Brown said that option costs \$7.60 per pickup. The monthly rate is \$9.60 for monthly pickup. Cole said a big reason for the rate request is that the county is charging Hudson more. Brown said Hudson does do payment arrangements with customers. Langner moved to approve the rate request. That motion was seconded by Cooper and adopted unanimously.
- b. Award RFP for Auditor Services—Langner moved to approve the bid that was submitted by Singer Lewak. That motion was seconded by Cooper and adopted unanimously.
- c. Award Bid for Fox Street Paving Project—Reigel said he obtained a bid for \$117,000. That's close to the original estimate of **\$29**,000. duPlessis moved to approve the bid. That motion was seconded by Watson and adopted unanimously.

Cole adjourned the meeting at 6:09 p.m.
