Oregon OSHA requirements for Agricultural Labor Housing (ALH)

1. Registration

- a. Background and purpose of Oregon OSHA (promote safety and health in the workplace); housing is a unique area for us; rules OAR 437-004-1120 vs. 1910.142
- b. <u>437-004-1120</u> (1)(a) (f): Our rule applies to any housing provided to workers by an agricultural employer in connection with employment (housing can be given to, rented, or leased to)
- c. Registration process:
 - i. Step 1: a no cost housing consultation from your <u>local field office</u> (and if there has been a lapse in registration)
 - ii. Yearly <u>registration</u> (contact OR OSHA at least 45 days before occupancy) + post the certificate
 - iii. Contact <u>Kate Ryan</u> ALH Coordinator; or for other H2A questions contact <u>Dora Herrera</u> (Foreign Labor Certification Program Coordinator)
- 2. Why or when does Oregon OSHA conduct an enforcement inspection of housing? Complaints (from worker or advocate group or other), or on the scheduled list (approximately every 3 years)
- 3. Commonly cited violations: reminder that multiple agencies have jurisdiction (in this case, building codes)
 - a. Reports and Statistics (https://osha.oregon.gov, then Reports and Statistics, then Top 25
 Violations) (the following is not an exhaustive list of requirements see rule)
 - i. (6) Site Requirements: (a) (q)
 - 1. Grounds must be substantially free from wastewater, garbage, noxious plants, etc.
 - 2. Cut back grass, weeds, and brush 30' from housing during occupancy
 - 3. Prevent/control the breeding of mosquitos, flies, and rodents in and within 200' of housing
 - 4. Provide electricity to all housing units (4/S Electricity applies to ALH)
 - ii. (11) Laundry Facilities: (a) (d)
 - 1. Provide washing tray(s), tub(s), or machine(s) plumbed with hot and cold water in a 1:30 ratio
 - 2. Provide clothes lines or drying facilities that meet the needs of the workers (ex. clothesline outdoors on west side doesn't suffice in the winter)

- 3. Drains for waste water
- 4. Common use laundry rooms must have a slop sink

iii. (12) Toilet Facilities: (a) – (k)

- 1. Locate within 200' of housing
- 2. Maintain usable/unobstructed path to toilets
- 3. Ratio of 1:15 for each gender, "assure" privacy
- 4. Clean common use toilet facilities daily
- 5. Ventilate toilet rooms per building code
 - a. Portable toilets are designed to be vented through the holding tank keep the lid down!

iv. (13) Portable Toilets, chemical toilets and privies (a) – (d)

- 1. Location and construction of privies according to OR DEQ
- 2. Locate privies (outhouses) at least 100' away from living areas, and places food is prepped/served
- 3. Portable toilets and privies must have "adequate" lighting
- 4. Service portable and chemical toilets at least weekly; clean portable toilets, chemical toilets, and privies at least daily

v. (15) Garbage and Refuse Disposal Outside of Buildings

- 1. Provide at least 1 30 gallon or larger container for every 15 occupants
- 2. Keep garbage covered; lids must fully close
- 3. Empty bins/dumpsters at least weekly

vi. (16) Living Areas: (a) – (q)

- 1. Safe and in good repair; protect workers from the elements, from the ground and surface water, and from rodents and insects
- 2. Walls and roof tight and solid; walls rigid and durable with cleanable finish
- 3. Screens on doors/windows; self-closing screen door
- 4. Bed and suitable storage for each occupant
- 5. Sleeping surface at least 12" above floor
- 6. Mattress/pads clean, good repair, free from insects/parasites
- 7. Uncovered mattress/pads must be fumigated before each occupancy; or use cover (clean before each occupancy)
- 8. All cook/live/sleep units must have at least 100 sq. ft per occupant
- 9. Single beds: 50 sq. ft per occupant; bunks 40 sq. ft per occupant

vii. (17) Fire Protection: (a) - (g)

- 1. Each year at occupancy a working smoke detector
- 2. Readily accessible fire extinguishing equipment

4. The \$\$\$ cost of violations

- a. Failure to register 437-004-1120(5)(b): minimum \$250
- b. Willful violation = cost x 25

5. New! (27) Heat in Labor Housing

- a. If heat rule triggered then must provide a cooling area (indoor or outdoor, mechanical or natural with element for cooling)
- b. Minimize heat in housing: bedrooms must be 78 or less during heat, if not, protect windows and provide fans
- c. Temperature awareness: provide a thermometer
- d. Employee and occupant: training, poster, emergency numbers
- e. Access to emergency services: working phone at all times
