

Rail Advisory Committee (RAC)

Core Purpose and Function:

The Rail Advisory Committee (RAC) provides advice to ODOT's Public Transportation Division (PTD) and Oregon Transportation Commission (OTC) on issues that affect freight and passenger rail facilities and services in Oregon, including rail project selection for Connect Oregon funding. The RAC also supports the ongoing development of the Oregon State Rail Plan, a document that outlines the freight and passenger rail network and identifies important projects that improve the rail network throughout the state. The RAC works with ODOT staff to update the Oregon State Rail Plan every four years.

Mission, Vision and Values:

The mission of the Rail Advisory Committee (RAC) is to advise ODOT's Public Transportation Division (PTD) and the Oregon Transportation Commission (OTC) on priorities, issues, projects and funding needs to improve rail infrastructure and to advocate for a safe, efficient, and commercially viable rail system to support the economic vitality of the State of Oregon.

MEMBERSHIP:
