- Prep your car: Check your tires, wipers, and fluids before driving in winter.
- Pack a winter car kit: Include a flashlight, blanket, water, snacks, and a phone charger.
- Carry chains: Know how to install them, and check for chain requirements on your route.



Drive cautiously: Slow down, increase following distance, and avoid sudden movements.

Did you know? Passing a snowplow on the right isn't just risky—it's illegal. The wing plow can extend several feet beyond the truck, making it easy to collide with.

• Enhanced signage with flashing lights or visibility improvements.


