## Oregon's Health IT Oversight Council (HITOC)

### December Meeting

HITOC's next meeting is [December 12](#) from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. and will be virtual. HITOC will provide input to the Oregon Health Policy Board on experiences with coordinated care organizations. Members of the public are invited to provide input as well. Much of the meeting will focus on the 2025 HITOC Workplan. Members will identify priority topics and projects for the upcoming year.

## CCO Procurement Community Input

The Oregon Health Policy Board (OHPB) would like to hear about Oregon Health Plan (OHP) member successes, challenges, and experiences with coordinated care organizations (CCOs). Input will inform the board's recommendations about the CCO model to the Oregon Health Authority and the Governor's office. OHPB is looking for stories from health care providers, caregivers, community-based organizations (CBOs) and OHP members. They are particularly interested to know more about CCO efforts regarding behavioral health referrals or partnerships, health care for children, and care that goes beyond medical appointments to support social and environmental development (such as information about, or access to, air conditioning or housing programs).

## Accessing Epic Clinical Information Outside of the EHR: EpicCare Link

HIT Commons, in partnership with OHA, hosted a learning webinar and published [this resource document](#) to assist community providers in connecting to and navigating the EpicCare Link tool. EpicCare Link is a free web-based portal that allows providers, such as referring physicians, care managers, and others, read-only access to a patient's medical record at a participating hospital/health system's Epic electronic health record (EHR). Through a single sign-on feature, providers can access most Oregon hospital records electronically to avoid costly and timely manual medical records requests. ## Piloting School-based Provider Access to Hospital Notifications

With support from HIT Commons and OHA, Centennial School District became the first in Oregon to go live on the [PointClickCare health IT tool \(formerly EDIE / Collective Medical platform\)](#) in September 2024. Through this pilot, Oregon school-based providers can be informed in real-time when youth have a hospital encounter, which empowers new ways to engage and support youth and their families and to ensure youth receive the school-based supports they need following a behavioral health crisis. This Centennial pilot is being implemented in partnership with the Multnomah Educational Service District with funding and staff support from HIT Commons. ## Federal Policy Comment Opportunities

### Public Feedback: Cancer Clinical Trials Matching Dataset

ASTP welcomes public feedback on the US Core Data for Interoperability + (USCDI+) Cancer Clinical Trials Matching draft dataset. The goal is to establish a standardized set of data elements reported in a

consistent format. The dataset would improve the accuracy and efficiency of matching patient data with open clinical trial protocols. ASTP is seeking input on the importance, ease of collection, and potential burden of electronically capturing and exchanging these data elements. ### **Public Feedback: USCDI+ Respiratory Illness**

ASTP is seeking public feedback on the USCDI+ Respiratory Illness and the acute respiratory distress (ARDS) draft data elements and their role in enhancing clinical trials. ### **Want to weigh in on OHA's Health IT work? How to make public comment:**

OHA's Health IT committee and workgroup meetings (i.e., HITOC, HITAG) are open to the public, and public comment is always welcome at the meeting during the specified time or in writing at any time. Public comment is an important part of OHA's committee work and is an opportunity for members of the public to provide input and feedback to the Committee or Workgroup.

**Meetings:** Typically, the public comment period is held at the end of each meeting. There may occasionally be more than one comment period. Members of the public are asked to comment or post in the chat only during this period, and to keep verbal comments to about 2 minutes. The public comment period is held solely for the public to share their thoughts with the Committee or Workgroup. Committee members are unlikely to ask questions or respond to public comment directly but consider public comments during committee work. If you know before the meeting that you'd like to provide public comment, you can email [HITOC.INFO@odhsoha.oregon.gov](mailto:HITOC.INFO@odhsoha.oregon.gov) to sign up. If you'd like to provide public comment during the meeting, you can message one of the hosts to sign-up. If you are unable to message, please speak up during the open public comment period.

**Written Comment:** You can also send written public comment to [HITOC.INFO@odhsoha.oregon.gov](mailto:HITOC.INFO@odhsoha.oregon.gov) at any time. To be included in the materials a meeting please submit the comment no less than 2 business days before the intended meeting. Please specify which group it is for – HITOC, HIE Workgroup, or HITAG. Written comment is emailed out and posted as part of meeting materials.
