Health equity by 2030

Oregon Health Authority's goal is to eliminate health inequities by 2030.

Oregon will have established a health system that creates health equity when all people can reach their full health potential and well-being and are not disadvantaged by their race, ethnicity, language, disability, age, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, social class, intersections among these communities or identities or other socially determined circumstances.

Achieving health equity requires the ongoing collaboration of all regions and sectors of the state, including Tribal governments to address:

- The equitable distribution or redistribution of resources and power; and
- Recognizing, reconciling and rectifying historical and contemporary injustices.

Transforming behavioral health

Build a behavioral health system that works or every child, teen, adult and family experiencing mental illness or harmful substance use.

Connect all people in Oregon to behavioral health services and supports when and where they need them

Enhance and expand behavioral health supports for **early childhood** by providing culturally responsive training, clinical supports and education to providers and families of young children

Strengthening access to affordable care for all

Ensure 100 percent of Oregonians have easy access to affordable health care, prioritizing communities most harmed by health inequities.

Support policies that increase the number of trained, utilized and reimbursed **Traditional Health Workers** (THWs)

Increase the convenience of accessing health care

Fostering healthy families and environments

Expand equitable access to:

- 1. Preventive health services and supports, including for new parents and families before and after birth;
- 2. Safe and accessible housing;
- 3. Healthy food and nutrition; and
- 4. Climate resilience.

Implement Medicaid waiver health related social needs (HRSN) services, health-related services (HRS), in lieu of services (ILOS) and CCO quality metrics within the framework of the Healthier Together Oregon State Heatlh Improvement Plan.

Putting it all together

- Strategically use HRS, SHARE, ILOS and other spending programs to address social determinants of health (SDOH) and eliminate health inequities by 2030
- Importance of strong community partnerships and power sharing
- Centering member and community experience and perspectives in all the work we do
- Creative, renewed funding strategies
- Continuous improvement and evolution

Individualized Supports Education workshops

- Offers culturally appropriate individualized support, education, goal setting and resource connection to help address health-related social needs.
- Complements Medicaid covered services like care coordination and treatment.
- Improves health quality by:
 - Removing barriers to access
 - Addressing social needs that distract from or worsen health conditions and their treatment
 - Helping rebuild trust in health systems

Asian Cancer Resource & Support Services

Language and culturally specific cancer support


- 2019 Oregon's first culturally and linguistically specific cancer program, supporting from prevention and screening to treatment and survivorship support.
- Offers resources, education materials, care coordination and emotional support.
- Supports cancer patients, survivors and family caregivers.
- Enhances access to care, improves treatment outcomes and boosts the quality of life for Asian cancer patients to ensure that no one faces cancer alone.


The assumption is that everyone benefits from the same supports. This is equal treatment.

Doulas Latinas International



Doulas Latinas International

- Community-based organization founded and led by Latino, Indigenous and immigrant leaders since 2007 in Oregon.
- Our vision is that every child deserves to be a healthy adult.
- We work with populations with lower incomes in rural and suburban areas to outreach and engage them in programs that we co-create based on the needs shared with us.
- We use social theories and praxis, such as popular education, pedagogy and Theatre of the Oppressed to engage everyone, dismantle individual and institutional oppression, and work toward policy changes.

Programs and opportunities

- **Doulas Latinas program**: A culturally and linguistically specific program in Spanish to train community doulas to serve pregnant people with lower incomes from the same communities the doulas come from; certified by OHA Traditional Health Worker Program.
- Alliance for Childbearing & Collective Health Equity (ACHE) with small Latino, Black and other partner organizations, using reproductive justice funds to extend doula services in rural areas. ACHE's main goals are:
 - Amplify workforce of community doulas; and,
 - Engage doulas and community in the movement and larger understanding about reproductive justice for policy changes to reducing obstetric violence and maternal mortality and morbidity.

Programs and opportunities

- Health literacy programs: Health education courses with evidence-based curriculums, such as CDC Diabetes Prevention, Living Well, diabetes and other chronic disease self-management. Doulas Latinas and community health worker leaders are trained and certified to deliver these programs.
- United for Tobacco Prevention Parents & Youth Alliance: Connects
 parents and youth (10 to 21 years old) in nine counties, through a series of
 monthly encounters, community events and conferences. Participants share
 their stories, connect and receive education and resources on tobacco,
 environment and climate change, and diseases. Planning to include
 substance use prevention.

Programs and opportunities

- Food sustainability: Creation of community vegetable gardens with the community members. Currently in Gresham and Hermiston, with plans for a new garden in Boardman.
- **Perinatal education in Spanish:** Series of classes conducted by certified Doulas Latinas for prenatal, birth and postpartum. It also includes vegetable collective harvesting and/or distribution for our *Nutricion y Amamantamiento* series of classes.
- Doulas Latinas mentorship and supervision: New program with curriculum in phase of development.
- Other languages and dialectics: Guatemalans Mam (staff), Quiche' and K'Anjobal, and Chuj (seeking); and Mixteco (EO).

Doulas Latinas Internationals' connections with CCOs in different regions:

- ✓ PDX-Metro: CareOregon and Trillium funds for specific programs. Vaccine funding from Providence Equity Program.
- ✓ Eastern Oregon: EOCCO
- ✓ Columbia Gorge and Marion County: beginning connection with PacificSource
- ✓ Yamhill CCO: recent connection and engagement with their Equity Committee
