



1115 Medicaid Waiver Background



What is the Oregon Health Plan?

Medicaid

Medicaid is the nation's public health care program. In Oregon we call it the Oregon Health Plan (OHP).

Oregon Health Plan


The Oregon Health Plan (OHP) is free health coverage available for children, teens, and adults who live in Oregon and meet income and other criteria. You can apply for OHP at any time during the year.



What is a Medicaid Waiver?

 The federal government has a standard set of rules each state must follow to get funds for Medicaid.

 States can ask the federal government for permission to change their Medicaid rules.



Oregon 1115 Waiver Changes



CHANGES

- Extended Oregon Health Plan (OHP) eligibility for young children, youth, and adults
- Continuous OHP eligibility and enrollment for children up to age six*†
- Two years of continuous enrollment for OHP members ages six and older*†
- Health-related social needs (HRSN) supports including housing, nutrition and climate supports*
- Coverage for young adults with special health care needs up to age 26*

† Note: These benefits are in effect and began in July 2023

^{*} Indicates an approved change that is first-in-the-nation

Climate and Outreach & Engagement Overview



Overview of HRSN Climate and O&E Benefits

Climate-Related Supports

Coverage began March 1, 2024

- Give people devices that keep temperatures in their homes healthy and clean the air.
- For members with a health condition that makes extreme weather or wildfire smoke dangerous and are <u>experiencing a life transition</u>.

Outreach and **Engagement Benefit**

Coverage began March 1, 2024

- Pays local organizations for helping eligible people get Health-Related Social Needs (HRSN) benefits.
- Also covers getting help with other needed services like legal, medical, and more.

Benefits to eligible members:

More support from community-based partners

Devices to help keep people safe during extreme weather and wildfires

Improved health outcomes

HRSN Climate Benefits Overview



Climate devices include:

Air conditioners for heat risks



Air filtration devices to
protect against
wildfire smoke



Mini fridges for temperaturecontrolled medications



Portable heaters for
winter



Portable power supplies for home medical equipment



Member Impact



Climate Benefit

A care coordinator learned during an assessment call with an OHP member that several people in the household (also members) had health conditions that would be negatively impacted by extreme heat and wildfire smoke. The conditions included cardiac issues, asthma and medications that needed refrigeration. To stay healthy during extreme weather, the family stayed at a neighbor's house.

The care coordinator told the member that they qualified for an air conditioner, air filter and mini fridge -- at no cost to them.

Now the family can remain in their home during extreme weather. The member said these benefits would drastically improve their quality of life.

HRSN Housing Benefit Update





Housing Services on 11/1/2024

These services include:

- Tenancy sustaining services.
- Medically necessary changes to homes to make them more accessible and safe.
 Includes exterminating pests, adding ramps and grab bars and help with heavy cleaning.
- Rent for up to six months, including past due amounts.
- Utility set up and costs for up to six months, including past due amounts.
- Storage fees.













Eligibility for HRSN Housing on 11/1/24

These benefits focus on keeping people in their homes. To qualify for HRSN Rent, Utilities Assistance and Tenancy Services, a person must:

- Be currently housed, and
- Need support maintaining current housing and has or will have a lease or written agreement with the landlord, and
- Have an income that is 30% or less than the area median income* in their area, and lack sufficient resources or support networks to prevent homelessness, and
- Have a Clinical Risk Factor.

Housing Clinical Risk Factors

Housing Clinical Risk Factors

- Complex behavioral health condition
- Developmental disability
- Complex physical health condition
- Needs assistance with Activities of Daily Living/Instrumental Activities of Daily Living or is eligible for Long Term Services and Supports
- Current or past interpersonal violence experience
- Repeated emergency department use
- Repeated crisis encounters
- Currently pregnant or 12 months postpartum and at risk of certain clinical factors
- Less than six years of age and at risk of certain clinical factors
- More than 65 years of age and at risk of certain clinical factors



Eligibility for HRSN Home Modifications/ Remediations on 11/1/24

To be eligible for HRSN Home Modifications/Remediations, a person must:

- 1. Have a Clinical Risk Factor, and
- 2. Belong to one of the HRSN Transitions Populations:
 - Released from incarceration in the past 12 months.
 - Discharged from a residential substance use disorder or mental health facility with 16 or more beds.
 - Current or past involvement in the Oregon child welfare system.
 - Changing from Medicaid-only to dual (Medicaid and Medicare) coverage, within the next three months or past nine months.
 - Have an income that is 30% or less than the area median income where the individual resides, and lacks sufficient resources or support networks to prevent homelessness.
- 3. Attest that the home modification or remediation will address a health need.



Examples of Potentially Eligible Members

- A person with a qualifying chronic illness loses their job and needs help paying back rent while they look for a new work.
- Someone needs help paying rent because they can't work during a hospitalization or while recovering from an injury.
- Family "doubles up" by moving in with friends and needs financial help to help pay costs to stay in that housing.
- Family at risk of eviction due to severe lack of upkeep of the home and requires heavy duty cleaning services to maintain housing.
- Parent needs help paying for rent when they have to take time off from work to care for child with special health care needs.

Expanding Benefits for Young Adults

Starting January 1, 2025, OHP will offer more benefits to young adults with qualifying health conditions under a new Medicaid eligibility category:


Young Adults with Special Health Care Needs (YSHCN).



Who are Young Adults with Special Health Care Needs (YSHCN)?

Young adults (19-26) with special health care needs (YSHCN) are those with, or at risk for, ongoing conditions:

- Physical, intellectual, or developmental disabilities
- Long-standing medical conditions
- Mental health conditions, substance use, or neurodevelopmental conditions




Why expand benefits for YSHCN?

• In Oregon, one in five children under age 18 has a special health care need.

 YSHCN need more health and social services than others of the same age.

 The waiver gives YSHCN extra time to transition from pediatric to adult coverage and care.



Who qualifies as YSHCN in 2025?

In 2025, young adults **19 – 20** may qualify as YSHCN if they have one of the following health needs:



One or more **complex chronic medical** conditions



A mental health condition, substance use disorder, or neurodevelopmental condition



An intellectual or developmental disability



An "elevated service need" identified through the YSHCN eligibility screening tool

YSHCN Eligibility Screening

Have an "elevated service need" identified through the YSHCN eligibility screening tool

HOW DOES IT WORK?

- All people 17 20 applying for Medicaid through the ONE system will be prompted to answer screening questions to see if they qualify as YSHCN.
- This screening tool may be used by young adults or their caregivers. They don't need to have a diagnosis to use the tool.

SCREENING SURVEY DEVELOPMENT

- OHA worked with OHSU's Oregon Center for Children and Youth with Special Health Needs (OCCYSHN) to develop the tool
- OCCYSHN coordinated an advisory workgroup to review the tool and conducted testing with users in 6 languages.

Changes to Benefits & Eligibility January 1, 2025

CURRENT ELIGIBILITY & COVERAGE (19 – 26)	YSHCN ELIGIBILITY & COVERAGE (19 – 26)
Up to 138% Federal Poverty Level	Up to 305% Federal Poverty level
EPSDT* and enhanced vision & dental benefits end at 21	EPSDT* and enhanced vision & dental benefits end at 26
No existing HRSN benefits	HRSN services covered

^{*} Early Periodic Screening, Diagnostic & Treatment (EPSDT): Federal benefit that covers all medically necessary and appropriate services or treatments for children and youth.

Refresher: EPSDT in Oregon

- Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnostic and Treatment (EPSDT) is a federally required benefit that provides complete health care services for children and youth under age 21 who are enrolled in Medicaid.
- As of January 1, 2023, all medically necessary and appropriate services are covered for OHP members under 21, regardless of placement on the Prioritized List.

Starting in 2025, YSHCN will have EPSDT coverage until their 26th birthday.



Rule(s)	Description of proposed changes
410-120- 0000	Updates HRSN Services and related definitions.
410-120- 2000	Updates HRSN Service Delivery to include housing, nutrition, and changes for climate and outreach and engagement services.
410-120- 3835	Aligns and clarifies service authorization timeline for HRSN Services.
410-141- 3510	Specifies HRSN-related details for provider contracting and credentialing, including housing and nutrition.




