Introducing the Oregon Health Authority's New Permanent Director of Emergency Operations, Eric Gebbie, DrPH



The Oregon Health Authority has welcomed Dr. Eric Gebbie, DrPH, permanently to the role of Director of Emergency Operations in the Health Security, Preparedness and Response (HSPR) Program at the Public Health Division. As Director, Eric will be managing and leading Oregon's public health preparedness and response work, such as analysis and implementation of policies and new legislation, strategic operational

planning, and overseeing the federal grants our state receives which drive local and tribal public health and hospital preparedness work.

Growing up in Portland, Eric's passion for public health was baked-into his family history. As an adult, Eric gained international experience while living and studying in St. Andrews, Scotland, where he studied for four years. In the late 90s, Eric made the move to New York city to attend Columbia University, where he studied international affairs. He recalls it was during this time in NYC, and after the 2001 terrorist attacks, where his interest in a career in public health and emergency preparedness began. He returned to Portland 13 years ago in 2011 to begin his tenure with the Oregon Health Authority. He began in a position very familiar to us – as the SERV-OR Systems Coordinator! Later roles also included the responsibilities of serving as the MRC State Coordinator and manager of the AmeriCorps VISTA partnership program.

Reflections on the Return of an Annual Medical Surge Exercise: Operation Pathfinder 2024



In June, the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) came together with state, federal, and community response partners for the full-scale medical surge exercise, Operation Pathfinder.

This annual event, which began in 2014, has traditionally been a multi-agency exercise based on response to a mass casualty incident (MCI) following a coastal earthquake and subsequent tsunami. However, in 2020 when the world collectively experienced the tragedy and stress of COVID-19, planning for the annual Pathfinder event was put on an abrupt hiatus.

In 2024, the return of Operation Pathfinder required necessary changes, and a decision was made to go "back to basics," scaling the event down to a single day and focusing on foundational skills of all-hazard mass casualty triage. Participants of Operation Pathfinder this year received a half day of didactic training

on topics such as Radio Communications, the En Route Patient Staging System (ERPSS), Patient Triage and Re-Triage for Transport, and a Burn Care Basics course. The afternoon consisted of a scenario-based, full-scale medical response drill designed to test medical response teams' ability to coordinate internally and conduct rapid triage of live and simulated patients.

Participants this year included volunteers from the Oregon Disaster Medical Team (ODMT), SERV-OR'S State Managed Volunteer Pool (SMVP), the Department of Veterans Affairs, Linfield University's School of Nursing staff and students, Cascadia Moulage, and safety staff with the Oregon Health Authority's Office of the Public Health Division Director. Although smaller than years' past, the 2024 Pathfinder event saw around 90 participants from instructors, patient actors, moulage artists, and of course our healthcare volunteers. We are so grateful for the return of Pathfinder and the opportunity to enhance skills in rapid medical triage, treatment, and incident coordination for partners and the state's healthcare volunteer pool. These types of training events, and the learning mindset our partners and volunteers bring with them, nudge us ever closer to being ready for whatever tomorrow brings.

The National Summit for Medical Reserve Corps



In May, the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) hosted the first MRC National Summit since 2012, in Chicago, IL. This event was made possible from the \$100 million American Rescue Plan Act funds appropriated to the National Medical Reserve Corps program in 2021 by the Biden Administration.

The national conference, hosted by NACCHO with

support from the Administration of Strategic Preparedness and Response (ASPR) and local MRC programs, provided a space for MRC State Coordinators, Unit Coordinators, and volunteers to connect, bond, and share stories of success. The <u>packed agenda</u> offered countless opportunities for learning from MRC peers with topics ranging from diversifying MRC leadership and membership, practical strategies for foundational organization and capacity building, to new and innovative initiatives like Vermont's pediatric dental clinics.

The theme of the Summit was "The Power of Community, Collaboration, and Connection: MRC Leading the Way for the Next 20 Years." This theme encouraged reflection on our communities of practice and growth during the first 20 years. We reflected on the response to COVID-19, a universal experience for MRC units; and other common challenges many face, such as legal protections for deployed volunteers.

Oregon was highlighted on the main stage during the National MRC Recognition Awards ceremony. While the National MRC Program has held these awards for many years, this was the first opportunity to celebrate together and acknowledge outstanding contributions from members, leaders

and partners over the past year. The awards recognized nominees across 12 categories and awarded stand-outs in each of these categories - and Oregon proudly had two winners!

We are so humbled and proud to be recognized and celebrate awardees **Carissa Heinige from Deschutes County MRC**, who was honored with the Outstanding New Leader Award and **Sophie Miller-DeSart**, **Oregon's MRC State Coordinator**, who received the Elizabeth Fitch Memorial Leadership Award. https://aspr.hhs.gov/MRC/Pages/2024awards.aspx.

MRC Regional Conference at Sunriver Resort

On April 22, the Oregon Health Authority hosted a conference for leaders within the Oregon Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) Coordinator network in Sunriver, OR. Unit Coordinators and volunteer leaders from the statewide MRC network gathered at Sunriver Resort for a full day of strategic planning and networking. The meeting marked the return of in-person annual conferences that were put on pause during the COVID-19 pandemic.

This year attendees, who represented 10 of the 14 MRC units in Oregon, were lucky to be joined by special guests Moji Obiako, MPH and Bryan Lewis, MPH, from the Administration on Strategic Preparedness and Response (ASPR) and Kathy Deffer, the Director of Preparedness with the National Association of City and County Health Officials (NACCHO). These federal partners shared critical resources that support MRC units and leaders.



Attendees were also joined by Emergency Education International co-directors Sarah Swofford and Jesus Leon Monsalve who presented on "Sustainable Strategies for Diversity and Cultural Competency in MRC Volunteer Management." This session was repeated a month later at the National MRC Summit in Chicago, IL.

Oregon's MRC network is small but mighty. Many of the leaders who coordinate an MRC in our state are either full-time staff (with MRC being less than 5% of their job duties) from county public health and emergency management programs. Or, they're full-time volunteer leaders, building their unit's capabilities year-round out of compassion and an innate commitment to service leadership. Our common thread as MRC leaders is uncommonly center stage. Meetings and conferences like these give us the opportunity to connect and consider our shared experiences, learn from our shared challenges, and plan for our shared futures.
