

# If Your Home Was Lost or Damaged in the 2020 Labor Day Disasters, ReOregon Can Help



## Homeowner Assistance and Reconstruction Program (HARP)

HARP offers financial assistance to help homeowners repair, rebuild, or replace their homes that were damaged or destroyed by the 2020 Labor Day wildfires and straight-line winds.

### HARP may be able to help with:

- Remaining repair costs
- Remaining costs to rebuild or replace your home
- Fixes to a replacement home

## If you have already completed your new home

Although HARP covers only future costs, please hold on to all your rebuilding receipts and records. If funds are available, reimbursement may be possible in the future.

## Are you eligible for HARP?

You **do not have to be a U.S. citizen or resident** to apply to HARP. Initially, the program will only assist survivors with low or moderate income (see below). However, **even if your income is higher than the amount listed**, we still want to hear from you.

The table below shows the income limits for each county, based on the number of people who will live in your household if you are eligible for HARP. For example, if your damaged home is in Jackson County and there will be four people in your household, your total household income must be less than or equal to \$105,350 a year for you to be eligible to receive assistance from HARP.

# How to apply to HARP

You can apply for HARP assistance either online at [re.oregon.gov](https://re.oregon.gov) or by working directly with a local community partner, who can assist you with the application process. Information about community partners in your area can be found at [re.oregon.gov](https://re.oregon.gov).

## You will need the following information:

- Proof that you owned your home and lived there as your primary residence
- Proof of damage from the 2020 Labor Day Disasters
- Proof of your current income
- Information on any insurance or other recovery funds you received
- Proof of identity (for example, photo ID)

If you have been helped by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), you can use your FEMA Individual Assistance ID number in place of some of the required documents. However, you will still need to provide proof of identity and current income.

## We want to hear from you

If your home suffered damages or was destroyed, you should start your application by completing the Eligibility Questionnaire regardless of whether you think you will qualify right away. We will review all information to identify what assistance you may be able to receive.
