## **City of Portland Cannabis Program Updates**

# Transfer of 3 Regulatory programs from Office of Community & Civic Life to Bureau of Development Services (BDS)

- Noise Control
- Liquor Licensing
- Cannabis Licensing, Compliance & Policy
  - Social Equity & Educational Development (SEED) Initiatives Program transferred to Prosper Portland
    - Allocated \$1 million in ongoing funds from cannabis tax revenue in grant funds that prioritizes Black, Indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC) and women led/owned small business initiatives and/or projects, programs or services that support economic and educational development of Black and brown communities, which were most impacted by cannabis prohibition.




# Cannabis Emergency Relief Fund (CERF)

• Provides <u>one-time</u> grants of *up* to \$25,000 for small sized licensed Cannabis businesses within Portland city limits, and *up* to \$5,000 to cannabis industry workers economically impacted from COVID19, vandalism, robberies, wildfire, and the residual effects of illness, trauma, and grief suffered from such impacts.

FY 21/22= \$1.33 million	FY 22/23= \$456,901
\$2.1 million requested	\$1.8 million requested
Businesses 76 received, 53 funded	64 received, 49 funded
Individuals 132 received, 120 funded	76 received, 75 funded
96% historically disadvantaged	68% historically disadvantaged
34% BIPOC	32% BIPOC



## **City of Portland Cannabis Program CPOT overview**



#### 2022 CPOT Annual Report findings:

#1: Lack of data and research hinders progress toward more effective, sustainable, and equitable cannabis policy.

#2: Significant work remains undone to address ongoing racial disparities and inequity within the industry.

#3: Small cannabis businesses are still not afforded the necessary resources to thrive in this competitive cannabis climate.



### CHEM Pillars of Health Equity™

"The part can never be well unless the whole is well"

#### **Human Equity**

The assuredness of access to experiences, opportunities, and resources that optimize 1) an individual's knowledge, skills, ability, capability, adaptability, introspection, empathy, enlightenment, self-regard, and self-actualization, and 2) their physical, mental, and spiritual fitness.

#### **Environmental Equity**

The assuredness of fair access to and maintenance of 1) clean air, water, land, and soil, 2) clean, natural, and safe outdoor spaces, 3) clean and safe indoor spaces, and 4) clean, safe, and consistent housing options.



#### Social Equity

The assuredness of fairness in policy, regulation, and in the distribution of social resources and services to ensure that policy, social constructs, and institutional practices 1) assure economic, environmental, and human equity, 2) demonstrate cultural respect and preservation, and 3) facilitate the social belonging, cooperation, cohesion, trust, participation, protection, and productivity of all people.

#### **Economic Equity**

The assuredness of 1) economic reciprocity and 2) fair access to opportunities and services that a) secure and grow economic resources such as income, savings, assets, and capital, and b) bring personal and collective agency over the flow of economic resources through a household or community.

- 3) Change the Marijuana Worker's Permit Test to reflect updated contents in the educational handbook.












# Recreational Marijuana Worker Permit Education



# **Looking ahead**

- Although legalization of adult use recreational cannabis has addressed some problems associated with prohibition, work remains to increase equity.
- One topic CPOT has discussed for years is social consumption of cannabis; other organizations have brought legislation to Salem, but Oregon trails other states who lead on this issue.
- CPOT this year is working on many topics and will pursue some recommendation for the creation of social consumption lounges, a new license type, or a better approach to allowing the use of cannabis by adults 21+.
