Oregon Heritage Conference a Success

Oregon Heritage hosted the first inperson Heritage Conference since 2018 in Forest Grove, April 17 - 20. Nearly 270 participants filled downtown and surrounding areas, making connections, experiencing the local heritage, and learning loads. The conference theme was "Make Space," and sessions explored many topics, from organizational succession planning to relationship development.

The conference featured plenary speaker Matika Wilbur from the Swinomish and Tulalip Tribes and founder and photographer of Project 562, a documentary project dedicated to

changing how we see Native America. She is also a filmmaker, writer, and podcast host. Plenary speakers Martha Barnette and Grant Barrett, hosts of A Way with Words, the popular radio show and podcast about language, and the Oregon Heritage Excellence Awards, featuring awards to Kim Moreland for her work supporting documentation and designation of properties related to Black history in Oregon and Maxville Site preservation work were also highlights. The conference also offered networking opportunities, including informal conversation sessions and the Opportunity Hall. Participants identified their favorite sessions in the evaluations, which included Learn, Land, Love: Rooting History for Care in the Land from Five Oaks Museum, Oral History Workshop, Black Preservation: Bridging the Gap, Succession Planning Conversation, Legacy of Native American Boarding Schools in Oregon, Oregon's Kitchen Table, Making Space for Collective Support of and Advocacy for Heritage. One comment for the Make Space (and Time) for Valuing and Engaging Diverse Partners session noted, "I learned so much about how each group is different and how we need to learn the needs and values of those organizations we want to work with, I could have listened to them for hours."
