1. Commission Business

- a) Welcome and Introductions (Information)

ACTION: Commissioner Reed moved to approve the October 10, 2024 agenda with the correction of the date at the top, Jesse Jackson is not able to attend, and the Bureau of Land Management Cemetery protection effort will take place prior to the Value of Heritage Resources in Community Recovery.  - a) Maureen Flanagan Battistella –Thanks for funding fire risk mitigation through tree removal at IOOF Cemetery in Medford, Long Town Cemetery in Applegate, and the Pheonix Pioneer Cemetery in Ashland. The Pheonix Pioneer Cemetery is under new management, Otis the Third and family, and has put up a new kiosk, metal arch, and is making new funding partners in the community.
 - b) Cricket Soules A dedication ceremony for three army veterans without headstones was done recently. The VA now has someone dedicated to working with historic headstones.
 - c) Megan Wrote in via Zoom chat wondering if there is a recommended software for cemetery records and mapping. Kuri Gill advised that the Cemetery Association of Oregon may have recommendations, but that there are many options available, so research will be needed to determine what will best suit their needs.

3. Disasters in Historic Cemeteries (Information)

 - ii) Tony shared his experience protecting heritage resources during the 2020 Oregon fires, the decisions that must be made, and resources that may or may not be available at the fire line.
- c) Value of Heritage Resources in Community Recovery-Kuri Gill
 - i) Resources that support heritage are critical in community recovery from disaster. From physical places to gather, to documenting and recording the disaster, to preservation of cultural resources, to helping emergency responders understand what is significant to the community, heritage resources are valuable tools for communities in and after disaster.
 - ii) The Commission discussed programs and resources in Oregon, such as Culture in City Reconstruction & Recovery, UNESCO, Value of Heritage in Disaster Resilience Report and Messaging Guide, Oregon Heritage Commission, Fact Sheet on Art & Culture: Helping People Before, During, and After Disasters, FEMA and other resources available on the Oregon Heritage Website.
- d) The Commission discussed specific ways they can support disaster planning for historic cemeteries.
 - i) Sending the Community Disaster Resilience Planning for Heritage Resources guidebook from IPRE to contacts within this community, sharing information at community gatherings, partnering with other agencies or districts utilizing the guidebook, getting sites ready with defensible space for people to gather post disaster, leveraging the high ground cemeteries for flood or tsunami evacuations, personally connecting to communities that have recently been disaster stricken, and cemetery grants.

 - i) The Cascadia earthquake is the highest priority for disaster preparedness. The Covid-19 pandemic has showed the fragility and reality of supply chains. All Oregonians should be two weeks prepared for their own resources, and organization should expect to be down much longer.
 - ii) Cemeteries, especially those at the far end of the supply chains, may be burying fatalities temporarily as part of a mass fatality management response. Discussion was had about preparedness planning, utilizing existing resources, and the obstacles that come with large disasters.

The Friends of Mildred Knipe Memorial Park hosted a visit to this interesting historic site owned by Douglas County. There is a "lost" cemetery at the park which the Friends have worked to identify using ground penetrating radar (GPR). Patrick O'Grady, researcher and an archaeologist training in the use of GPR shared more information about remote sensing techniques in this work.

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Historic cemetery records are critical materials documenting local history. They are important for cemetery management and for research. Historic cemeteries are managed by a variety of organization type with equally varied capacity to maintain the cemetery and the records. No matter the size and resources of the organization, records can and should be preserved and accessible. This document provides a checklist of considerations to determine the most effective records management, storage, access approaches for the organization.

Basic Steps

- Paper records
 - o Card files, ledgers, etc.
 - Store in a safe space.
 - Make multiple copies and store in different places.
 - Maps
 - Make multiple copies and store in different places.
- Digital Records
 - Search for existing records.
 - Online search Find-A-Grave, Million Graves, etc.
 - Scanned copies of records saved digitally.
 - Maps
 - Take really good photos.

2nd level steps

- Paper records
 - o Card files, ledgers, etc.
 - Archival Storage
 - Maps
 - Archival Storage
- Digital Records
 - Scanned copies Searchable PDFs
 - Spreadsheets
 - Google is free, others work
 - Information is entered so that it is searchable.

- o Maps
 - High quality scan for digital record.

3rd level steps

- Digital Records
 - o Scanned copies Searchable PDFs
 - Database
 - o Maps
 - Geographic Information System (GIS) based maps This are searchable and based on the locations of the burials. These can be linked to the record database.
