House Bill 2010, 5030

Senate Bill 5506





ORS 448.370-448.380



Grants to water suppliers to protect, restore, or enhance sources of drinking water through:

- Acquiring lands from willing sellers
- Entering into covenants, easements or similar agreements
- Repaying a loan used to finance one of the above



\$5M available (General Funds & Lottery Revenue Bonds)

Maximum grant award = \$3M



Partnerships with holders are allowed (other than state agencies)




Focus on water suppliers that serve:

- Rural communities
- Communities experiencing lower incomes
- Communities that are at or below a specified population level



Administrative Rulemaking





OAR Chapter 695, Division 48

January - April 2024: Convened RAC

June 2024: Held public comment period

July 2024: OWEB Board adopted rules





Eligible Applicants





Public Water Suppliers with service populations at or below 25,000 users, that are also classified in one of the following public Water System categories:

- Tribal Public Water Systems
- Community Water Systems (owned by local gov. or nonprofit)
- Transient Non-Community Water Systems (owned by local gov. or nonprofit)
- Non-Transient Non-Community Water Systems (owned by local gov. or nonprofit)
- Oregon Very Small Water Systems (owned by local gov. or nonprofit)



Eligible Properties & Project Types



Properties:

- Must benefit a drinking water source used by the Water Supplier
- Must be partially or fully within the Water Supplier's Drinking Water Source Area
- Both surface water and groundwater source protection are eligible

Project types:

- Acquiring lands from willing sellers
- Entering into covenants, easements or similar agreements
- Repaying a loan used to finance one of the above



Protective Instruments

Protective Instrument = the suite of acquisition and legal agreement options eligible for inclusion in this program, including:

- A legal document conveying an estate in fee simple absolute
- Granting a conservation easement
- Creating a real covenant or an equitable servitude
- Or establishing similar agreements







Partnerships





A Water Supplier may form a partnership with an eligible holder other than a state agency to provide support and capacity for the land transaction and/or long-term management of the property (an eligible holder is defined in ORS 271.715; for example, a land trust or soil and water conservation district).

Must submit documentation of formal partnership commitment at time of application.



Available Funding





- \$5,000,000 available within the program
- \$3,000,000 cap for individual grant requests

Given the limited funding, we encourage applicants to be conservative with their funding requests and attempt to leverage other funding sources.





Match





5% cash or in-kind match required from non-OWEB sources

Qualifying match:

- In-kind contributions to activities listed under <u>OAR 695-048-0100</u>, including the difference between the DWSP maximum allowable indirect rate (15%) and the applicant's indirect rate;
- Funding commitments made by others as a result of grant applicant efforts related to the proposed project;
- The forgiven portion of a loan used to acquire the Protective Instrument;
- Interest paid on a loan used to acquire the Protective Instrument;
 and
- A donated portion of a sale.





Online Application System



ALL APPLICATIONS MUST BE SUBMITTED THROUGH OWEB'S ONLINE SYSTEM

Apply for a DWSP Grant Online

1. Obtain a login (username and password).

If your organization already has an OGMS login, skip to step 2.

An OGMS login is required to access the online grant application. Only one login per organization is allowed. If no login exists for an organization, please email Leilani Sullivan to request one. Include the following in your email:

- Organization name and address
- Grantee Contact Information: name, title, email address, and phone number for the person who will receive all communication from OWEB and sign any grant agreements.
- Payee Contact Information: name, email address, and phone number for the person who keeps records and submits payment requests and documentation.
- FEIN (Federal Employer Identification Number). OWEB may enter into agreements only with legally established entities. OWEB will review potential applicants prior to creating an OGMS login.
- Per federal guidance, all OWEB grantees must be registered at the System for Award Management (SAM) before receiving a grant agreement. Entities will receive a
 non-proprietary identifier (called the Unique Entity Identifier (UEI).) This identifier is assigned by SAM (<u>sam.gov</u> is a free service) and entities must update their
 registration annually.

2. Log in to the Online Application.

Guidance to help you fill out the application is always available in the top navigation bar of the online application. An application template is also available after you log in and choose "Create a New Application."



DWSP Evaluation Criteria

OAR 695-048-0110

All projects will also be evaluated on the Climate-Related Evaluation Criteria described in OAR 695-005-0045:

- (1) How engagement with, and input from, local communities disproportionately impacted by climate change has informed or will inform the project.
- (2) How changing climate conditions are incorporated into the project and how the project will contribute to durable adaptation and resilience for ecosystems, including human communities.
- (3) How consideration of greenhouse gas emissions or long-term carbon sequestration or storage has informed the project.

Small population size

Lower income population

Rural population

Seasonal variations in number of users

Drought or low water supply

Extent of risks to water quality

Duration and type of Protective

Significance of the land protection to drinking water sources

Existence of or plan to develop a long-term management plan, or justification as to why it is not necessary for the proposed Protective Instrument

Clearly defined & documented partnership including respective roles & responsibilities

Partnership mission in support of protection or restoration of natural resources and/or drinking water.

Capacity & resources for long-term protection, restoration, and/or enhancement

Ability to complete transaction & due diligence within grant timelines

First Grant Cycle Timeline



October 21, 2024: Grant solicitation cycle opens (pre-application consultation is required by Nov. 27, 2024)

December 12, 2024 @ 5PM: Grant applications due in online system

Jan – March 2025: Soundness & technical reviews, virtual site visits

April 2025: Board approval of recommended projects

October 2026: Approximate closing deadline for funded projects
