Umm, we have a little bit of an agenda to go through and we have some steps to get to that, but I as I was mentioning a moment ago, I I really want the spirit of this meeting to be the beginning of a conversation that I envision will probably take the lion share of the next 12 months, if not more.

But umm, so to get started we need to approve the agenda and the agenda as laid out there is approve the agenda, discuss goals and process and then ideas discussion on that.

That Third Point is what I'm hoping is probably the most part of our conversation today.

And then we'll take public comment and then talk about next meeting before I entertain a motion.

Do any members of the Subcommittee have anything to request to change or add to

the agenda as laid out?

Thank you very much.

Moving on, so goals and process, so the the as a bit of a real quick history about a year ago the crack the Council as reestablished.

I believe this bylaw subcommittee, I think it had been established a few years before and had never really been off the ground.

So a year ago reestablished it this Bylaws Subcommittee and one of the two charges we were given by the full Council was to draft bylaws.

Because this, the Council has been in existence.

Since 2017, is that right?

So we're we're getting close to the and there's mark.

Hello, mark.

Uh, no worries.

We're just getting underway.

We are recording and the agenda was adopted, but we're just getting into the into the meat of it now.

#### Scott Stauffer 2:52

Well, a year ago the Council reestablished the Bylaws Subcommittee creating bylaws for the Council was one of the main project objectives.

The other objective of the subcommittee was to create a hiring process for public records, advocate the beginning of this year is what we spent our time working on that front.

And so now we've gotten that part done and we're working now on the bylaws and we do anticipate this being the main priority of the Subcommittee for the next 12 months at least.

So that's where we are.

That's we're working on today and to get into that conversation, I wanted to call attention.

The committee's attention to a couple of things, just to kind of preface the discussion, first of all, as I believe everyone on the call probably as well aware that the Council, the public records Advocate Office, were created in state law by the legislature or as 192.461483 establish those things.

Yeah.

And that office, that agency and this Council and the Council that this committee reports to, and so it's important to start off in remembering that there are certain

specific directives that we've been given by the legislature on things we have to do and in preparing for that today, I cut and paste and took a look.

And I hope you've had a chance at probably before today at some point to take a look at those directives.

I'm not going to go line by line by right now, but I just wanted knowledge that what's called out in those in that statue is, you know, the main mission.

The main purpose of our Council, and I think that to a degree those need to that purpose and mission, need to be reflected in the bylaws.

Umm, so I wasn't gonna call it anything specific, but I will ask members of the Subcommittee if there's anything specific in the Rs you'd like to mention at this point as we start the conversation.

OK, just take that pin that in the back of your mind as lodging that the OS is where we where we get our authority right.

And then when yeah, Mark?

I know we're moving towards being able to publish it soon for public commentary.

I I I would gather that something you're gonna share with the public records that Council prior to to.

You know, filing with the Secretary of State, is that fair?

Yes, I previously supplied a draft version of the prat.

Quite a while ago and there wasn't, and I we had asked for commentary in between meetings directly to us.

We didn't receive any, so hopefully that means everyone's OK with it, but I did put on the draft agenda.

Excuse me, Mark, that we need to develop for the annual meeting, one of the items I would present on, I think I put it there and if not, I will put it there about the current state of the oar process.

No, no, no.

Yep.

Uh, but no, actually marked.

That's a that's a decent seque from the Rs to the OR.

Because while we acknowledge that the IRS is our authority to operate, I'm and as a Council and as the public records advocate agency, those rule that that law is put into place by the rules, the state administrative rules that are adopted, and Todd just talked about some of the rules that his office is preparing and will present to the the Council at our annual meeting.

#### Scott Stauffer 7:17

So there's there's a couple ways that we implement the the way we function and and how we implement the changes that we are legally bound to do.

There's the administrative rules, which are the formal implementation, interpretation of our statutory authority right.

Those are the hard and fast things we have to do.

Or the way we interpret the charges we've been given.

And then there are bylaws which are the charge of this subcommittee.

It's sort of the internal operational processes and steps and actions and protocol that we agreed to as a Council to provide the structured clarity and consistency that a good functioning board needs or should have in place.

So we've got the state law, we've got a formal administrative rule process that we would work with Todd's office to implement as we see fit and it doesn't necessarily need to be every little detail because that's there's a whole process and 180 days and on the whole whole hearing system that you have to go through to get the rule to change.

And then there are certain things and expectations that we all wanna see.

Wanna see timely meetings?
We wanna see efficiently run meetings.
We wanna expect a certain order.

JB Jo A. Barker 8:21 Like tell.

#### Scott Stauffer 8:23

We want to understand what the chairs duty called out the chair or the Vice chair. If we have those or what are subcommittees, we have these roles on our Council and we want to clarify what they do.

We also want to perhaps clarify what the public records advocate and the Deputy PRAI do in terms of relating to the Council, so there's there are and and it's perhaps easier and better for the operation of our Council if we don't put those in rules that are harder to change as things evolve overtime.

So as we just start this conversation about what should be in the Council's bylaws, just wanted to keep that in mind.

We may come across a topic that, hey, this actually makes more sense to be an OR. And then there's a conversation that should be had with the full Council and and Todd Office and Todd, about how that would go about.

But I'm guessing there's going to be a good chunk of it, if not the most of it. These things that we talk about that are actually meant for our internal operations and our bylaws.

So and sometimes there could be something that could live in both camps, right? But just as we start this process, I wanted to call out that not all the topics that we might initially think going to BIOS should be there and actually maybe a rule. So there's a difference in how we can approach some of these things and we're really trying to focus on those internal operations, the bylaws, but undoubtedly some oil

A Todd or marker will or Emily.

are material will come up.

Anything you wanna talk about, ask about differences between ORS, OAR and bylaws.

I saw Joe's comment.

Thank you for the help you being there.

Todd must have done that, umm, one other thing.

Just to clarify too, because this was just recently clarified for myself as well. Uh.

The the uh the crack the PR a the public records advocate and the Council currently do not have any Oregon administrative rules on the books.

The one that tab was just talking about the market toddler just checking in on that would be our agency and our Council's first involvement in an OR so there are over 400 other state commissions and there are hundreds and thousands of ORS.

So it's it's a well tried path, but this council is agency of not done it before and so and that way when we get to that point, I think it's helpful for everyone to appreciate that this is this group's first time through that that show.

So anything else on the differences between law?

Yeah.

Mark, maybe.

Yeah, just just a reminder, we did do a bylaw for the hiring of the advocate.



#### Scott Stauffer 10:47

That's true.

We did create that procedure, part of it and so again great segue here in a moment, Mark.

But we'll get, I think putting the hiring process is something we should put our list to put it in the bylaws, absolutely we.

So we already started working on it.

Yes, give ourselves credit for that work, if nothing else on this page, I'm going to go to the next one, which just as a timeline, I've kind of hinted out a couple of times. I see this as a 12 month process.

At least we have all this isn't going to be anyone's primary directive, right? We have other things to work on, so I see the fall.

We're gonna start doing our research.

We're gonna start the conversation today.

We're gonna do our research next couple of months and then acknowledging it's the holidays and things get busy sometime around the end beginning of the year. I'd like us to start divvying up pieces and start actually writing some things out that

way, perhaps by perhaps by February, March of 25, we can start putting the pieces

together and seeing what sticks on our on our bylaws.

Draft April may meet as needed to finalize those and then hopefully by the the Council's midyear or summarise time meeting, we can present a draft bylaws for that group to the full Council to consider any questions about that timeline.

So one of the things that we may want to do at our annual meeting is see if we can get a few other pract members to participate in this process because again, my my ability to participate at at in the first six months of the new year, we'll be a challenge. So just just a heads up and note to you is the chair that that my ability to participate may be challenging.

Fair enough, I think.

I think I've been to enough legislative sessions on the Council to to realize how much of A time set that they can be, so I appreciate that, mark.

There's nothing else on the calendar on the schedule and move to the next part, which is agenda item 3.

The bylaws, idea, discussion.

So really this is what I hope we spent most of our time today.

And it doesn't take that long to get going.

That that's OK too, but I'm gonna switch to a Word document here so I can take notes as we go.

But, umm, what?

What needs to be in our bylaws?

What?

What?

When you think of bylaws which I know is top of mind for everybody, until we all focus on our free time, we think about how boards and committees and councils operate.

That's just the coolest thing to talk about.

What?

But when you do, what kind of things are there?

I've kind of thrown out something of a an outline there based on some bylaws I've worked in and based on conversations that I've had up to this point at the Council's had so before I I'm gonna switch sharing to a Word document that has the same information here. Umm.

And hopefully everyone's now looking at a screen with a Word document in it. Yep.

OK, it's the same version of my PowerPoint slides, just in a word doc. So.

So I kinda just to get it going here.

Some of the sections that I think standard bylaws tend to have, you got your name, the purpose and authority, your membership in terms meetings in order of business. And there's going to be, I think, quite a few things under meetings in order of business.

I mean, we want to regulate and standardize our operations that sort of the meat of a lot of the meetings for the Council.

I know there's been discussion about offers, officers and duties, and we want under there and and here I kind of went to the orders.

So I kind of pulled out the things that jumped out of me in terms of the Council shall do this or Council will do this and that's the appointment of the RA which mark I think that's probably the the space where we'll get our hiring process of verbiage in there is under that appointment that PRA impact, all right, cloud, uh, there's a call out to an agent to do an agency survey.

There's a directive to respond to public records requests.

In general, I kind of read that to me request to our agency in their room, but we can assess that out a little bit.

Umm.

Proposed record request related legislation advise the public records Advocate Office and there's annual reporting discussed to the legislature and the PRA to the PRAC. And then I think most bylaws have a call out for how you amend the bylaws. So that's we're starting.

I've done all the talking and so like the step back now and turn over the mic to our good subcommittee members and and what's missing from this list?

What do you wanna?

What?

What should we have on these bylaws?

Scott, I was thinking under the agency survey category, I think that is a subset of the pracs sort of systemic analysis ability over all.

  So I don't know if we want to specifically say agency survey because we may choose other ways to explore our authority or just utilize it in different ways.

I I think it was that you can that the Council will periodically survey state and local governments on on and if I recall correctly, it was more focused on timeliness of responses.

#### AP ALBERT Todd \* PRA 17:00

Yeah, I found it.

It's four.

It's one 92483, subsection one, and it says that the Council affectively shall periodically perform all the following survey, state agency and other public body practices and procedures for, and it's about receiving and responding to request is closing records, determining Fiesta mates and imposing waivers and determining and applying exemptions.

And so I didn't say that hoping you'd be able to write that all.

Maybe you could just do you wanna put in the statutory authority for now for that section?

# AP ALBERT Todd \* PRA 17:43 As a placeholder.

# Scott Stauffer 17:44 I think sure.

So so there was rewarding it and then we suggesting me go under a different section than not and we can, we can talk about you know what section and subsections they go under when we're start writing it.

I want to make sure we're capturing the big the big topics, so for what you were proposing, Todd, did we catch that, I catch that and what's written here.

Let me see.

Yeah, effectively.

I mean actually 483 A through.

E lays out all the duties of the Council.

1A through E so it's more than just this actually.

OK.

We can refine that list, but going checking out this tab that there Rs.

ALBERT Todd \* PRA 18:38

Yeah.

And then in terms of statutory duties, we have a biennial duty to report as the Council to the legislature, we could institute an annual one if we wanted to, but a requirement is every two years.

I say we lit.

As as the person who has been assigned to write the report.

Well, you're in the chair.

Obviously we can disagree, but you know we do it in a professional manner.

So just sort of like basic statement of goals for how we want to relate to one another.

So you're basically saying no food fights during our meetings, right?

Scott Stauffer 20:49

Yeah.

Like.

AP ALBERT Todd \* PRA 20:53

Sure, load.

Scott Stauffer 20:54

The city? Uh.

Here, here, Milwaukee, we have a code of conduct that we have our board and committee members sign and it's almost exactly what Todd said.

And in addition, it talks about how the body communicates with specific groups, like staff, the public, and in that there's A to the consensus part.

There's an important piece that we found for those bodies.

Umm, how a Council member will represent themselves in terms of speaking for themselves on a thing or speaking for the full Council.

I mean just kind of calling out, if the Council hasn't taken a stand, then an individual member of Council has potentially taking, they're making their own statement on their own behalf.

So we we have no authority to appoint or unappointed a Council member, but maybe, as part of member expectations and like something about, like attendance or providing notice, if you're not going to attend or like some sort of like expression of concern after app pens absence from X number of meetings or something, just to give ourselves a little agency over our membership.

Right, yeah.

Yeah, yeah, I I did recall what I did want to mention. You know?

UM, the the notion of that that we work on a consensus basis, I have instituted that as the Chair of the PRAC.

That's not necessarily I I I don't want to necessarily encumber a future chair in that fashion now.

It's just been my hope and I've worked towards seeking consensus amongst the Members and I, I think generally that has worked, but I also don't want to necessarily. Hand tie a future chair in that way.

And so I I think perhaps you know, it's up to the PRACK members ultimately who becomes the chair and the Council can set the expectations of what the Chair will pursue, right.

So you may want to put something in there to that effect, but I that's just how I've operated it.

I don't know if there's a better way to do so, and I don't wanna necessarily encumber a future chair of the Council as well, so that that's just the approach that I've taken. Others may have a different approach, and so you know the the statements got that you had made earlier about trying to seek consensus.

I mean, I think that that's a goal whether or not it's a worthy of being a bylaw. I don't know.

And I think that's fair.

I mean, when the city and the City of Milwaukee, we did the whole Bylot template and all this stuff a couple years ago, the Code of Conduct is a separate document from our bylaws.

And so I think to your point, mark, that's a fair, fair question.

I mean, we're trying to set norms and you know, a culture of how the Council operates, but sometimes those are unwritten and sometimes it's helpful to have it written.

You know, I think it's a good question.

Having a a much more developed set of rules around order makes sense and so you know stating that the the assumption is consensus with kind of a Robert's rules is a backup if we get into contentious meetings I think provides good structure and and allows the parties to to work together without having to uh worry about significant changes to meeting order between administrations or in the event of subject matter that could get a little bit more contentious.

Scott, just as the chair of the Prack, it's been my custom.

Shall we say, to ensure that the public can address the Council at our meetings now, if, if the if this Subcommittee on Bylaws wants to include that in our bylaws, I I wouldn't have any quibble with that, but I think that ultimately becomes a decision for the Council itself, but it would be, Joey, be my intention as as the Chair, to keep that tradition in place.

I don't think that anybody on the Council would oppose continuing that practice, and if it wants to be included in the bylaws, so long as the Council approves it, I I wouldn't have a quibble with that whatsoever.

But it I don't know if it's something that needs to be placed in the bylaws or not. That's probably a question for for the Council, but it, you know, as I said and as I'll maintain, we'll we'll continue that tradition as long as I'm sitting in the chair.
