## Activity 1 – Walking Tour

Learn firsthand about energy efficiency and renewable energy development through site tours of several projects in downtown Portland. We'll highlight buildings that participated in Energy Trust programs and see a range of projects, meeting site owners to learn about their efforts to lower operating costs, manage energy use, and make their built environments more comfortable and resilient. ## Activity 2 – Hiking Tour
