PUBLIC REPRIMAND AND PROBATION 8 9 10 On November 1, 2024, the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission 11 (Commission) issued a Notice of Opportunity for Hearing to Ernest C. Johnston 12 (Johnston), in which the Commission charged him with Gross Neglect of Duty and /or 13 Gross Unfitness. The Notice was sent via U.S. First Class Mail and U.S. Certified Mail 14 Receipt 9589 0710 5270 2162 7864 78 to the address on file with the Commission. The Notice designated the Commission file as the record for purposes of proving a prima 15 16 facie case. The Certified Mail receipt was returned to the Commission signed. The 17 regular first-class mail was not returned to the Commission and assumed delivered. The 18 Notice of Opportunity of Hearing, dated November 1, 2024, and signed by Cristina 19 Edgar, Director of Professional Practices, stated: 20 "IF A REQUEST FOR HEARING IS NOT RECEIVED WITHIN THIS 21-DAY 21 PERIOD, YOUR RIGHT TO A HEARING SHALL BE CONSIDERED WAIVED 22 UNLESS YOUR FAILURE TO REQUEST A HEARING WAS BEYOND YOUR 23 REASONABLE CONTROL. IF YOU DO NOT REQUEST A HEARING, 24 WITHDRAW YOUR REQUEST FOR HEARING, OR IF YOU FAIL TO APPEAR 25 AT A HEARING, OR NOTIFY THE COMMISSION THAT YOU WILL NOT APPEAR AT HEARING, THE COMMISSION WILL ADOPT AN ORDER OF 26 27 DEFAULT WHICH MAY INCLUDE THE REVOCATION OR SUSPENSION OF 28 YOUR LICENSE OR OTHER DISCIPLINE." 29 30 On November 6, 2024, Commission staff received email correspondence from 31 Johnston's legal counsel member Noah Barish indicating Johnston will not be 32 requesting a hearing in this matter, and Johnston understands the Commission will 33 therefore enter a default order. 34 35 To date, the Commission has not received any further contact from Johnston or Barish 36 and therefore finds Johnston to be in default and enters the following findings of fact, 37 conclusions of law, and final order, based on the files and records of the Commission 38 concerning this matter.

FINDING OF FACT

The Commission has licensed Johnston since February 14, 2005. Johnston held a
Professional Teaching License with endorsements in Biology (PK-12), Legacy
Middle Level (PK-12), and Integrated Science (PK-12) valid from February 10,
2023, through February 9, 2028. During all relevant times Johnston was
employed by the Grants Pass School District (GPSD) at Grants Pass High School.

2. On October 13, 2022, the Commission received a misconduct report from GPSD indicating Johnston may have committed acts which constitute gross neglect of duty and/or gross unfitness. Specifically, the report alleged Johnston corresponded in total of over 500 times via email with a female student between February 2022 and June 2022 and discussed various personal topics not related to school. Johnston used pet-names with the student, attempted to conduct at least one (1) Zoom video call with the student, waged sports bets with the student betting candy and soda, played online games with the student outside of school hours and communicated in-app through the game online chat during evening hours. Johnston also provided the student privileged information such as how to access the high school campus after hours using a special unlocked door. Johnston also solicited feedback from the student about a personal novel he wrote involving both himself and the student. It was also alleged that Johnston did not report to his supervisor when the student shared various personal photos with Johnston via online communication as well as "Short stories".

3. Investigation determined Johnston had been the subject of two prior GPSD misconduct investigations taking place on April 4, 2019, and April 9, 2020. On April 4, 2019, a student in Johnston's class requested to use the restroom and upon their return Johnston shoved them into their seat, resulting in Johnston receiving a non-disciplinary Letter of Expectation. On April 9, 2020, Johnston was heard during an all-staff Zoom meeting making derogatory statements about staff when he thought his microphone was muted. This resulted in Johnston receiving a Written Reprimand.

4. Investigation determined on August 18, 2022, a parent of the involved female student observed over one hundred (100) online personal messages shared between Johnston and their daughter and reported this matter to both the GPSD and the Grants Pass Police Department. Subsequent investigation took placed and determined the following:

- Johnston taught the involved female student her Freshman year during the
 2019-2020 academic year.
- Between February 2022, and June 2022, Johnston communicated electronically almost daily via school email with the involved female student after she had not been a student in Johnston's class for over a year.
- The majority of the emails occurred from approximately 07:30 AM and 3:30 PM during school days and focused on conversations about school, schoolwork, sports, and a mutual online game Johnston and the student played together called "Clash Royale". However, Johnston and the student also discussed your personal lives, family life, favorite foods, hobbies, purchasing a home, social life aspects, and sporting interests.
- Between February 2022, and June 2022, Johnston and the student made several personal bets on sporting events and waged soda or candy as a prize.
- Johnston gave the student several pet-names including "Homie, old man, and Sensei" and addressed the student by these names in electronic communication during this time.
- Johnston provided information to the student on how to access the high school campus using a back door to a building prior to the front entrance opening.
- Johnston offered to give the student a tour of the high school and her new classes during the 2021-2022 school year.
- Johnston encouraged the student to become a teaching-assistant in his class during the 2021-2022 school year and promised the student special privilege to access their cell phone during class so long as other students did not see.
- Between February 2022, and June 2022, Johnston drafted a lengthy chapter book and sent each chapter to the student for review and input. The novel

depicted Johnston and the student fighting zombies in a post-apocalyptic world and it ended with Johnston adopting the student.

- Between February 2022, and June 2022, Johnston played an online video game called "Clash Royale" with the student after school hours. Johnston engaged in additional personal communication with the student through the in-game chat function and would stay up late in the evening playing the game with the student, the student's mother, and Johnston's high school-aged son.
- On an unknown date during the 2021-2022 school year, the student shared several personal photos with Johnston electronically. The photos displayed "selfies" of the student and photos of her family at a wedding. Johnston did not report to his supervisor that the student had sent him personal photos.
- 5. Investigation found that on September 5, 2022, all District and law enforcement investigation was completed and no criminal arrests were made but Johnston received one-day of unpaid suspension from his position and a Letter of Reprimand from GPSD. GPSD records documented that Johnston had previously received training on March 9, 2022, on how to keep appropriate boundaries with students in an online platform.
- 6. During Commission investigation Johnston admitted to communicating with the student as previously established and Johnston verified that it was almost a daily occurrence. Johnston said that following the COVID-19 distanced learning mandate the involved female student did not return to campus during the 2021-2022 school year and continued online courses from home. Johnston said this resulted in him emailing with the student almost daily during school hours about both school related topics and personal topics. Johnston admitted he was aware of a GPSD policy prohibiting staff from communicating with students electronically via social media accounts, personal emails, or personal phone devices but felt it was appropriate to communicate with the student via school email accounts. Johnston said that Grants Pass High School administrators encouraged staff during distanced learning to engage students about their

1 mental, social and emotional health and said Johnston continued to do so in the 2 following school years. Johnston admitted he should have reported the student 3 sending him photos and that he should not have shared excerpts from his book 4 with the student or played video games with the student. 5 6 CONCLUSIONS OF LAW 7 By engaging in the above conduct in paragraph four (4), Johnston engaged in 8 Gross Neglect of Duty in violation of ORS 342.175(1)(b); OAR 584-020-0040(4)(n) 9 as it incorporates OAR 584-020-0010(1) (Recognize the worth and dignity of all 10 persons and respect for each individual), OAR 584-020-0010(5) (Use professional 11 judgment); OAR 584-020-0025(2)(a) "Establishing and maintaining classroom 12 management that is conducive to learning", OAR 584-020-0025(2)(e) "Using 13 district lawful and reasonable rules and regulations", OAR 584-02-0030(2)(b) "Skill in communicating with administrators, students, staff, parents and other 14 15 patrons"; OAR 584-020-0040(4)(0) as it incorporates OAR 584-020-0035(1)(c)(A) 16 (Not demonstrating or expressing professionally inappropriate interest in a student's personal life), OAR 584-020-0035(1)(c)(D) (Honoring appropriate adult 17 18 boundaries with students in conduct and conversations at all times), and OAR 584-19 020-0035(1)(c)(B) "Not accepting or giving or exchanging romantic or overly 20 personal gifts or notes with a student". 22 The Commission's authority to impose discipline in this matter is based

FINAL ORDER

The Commission adopts and incorporates herein the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, and based thereon, imposes a Public Reprimand upon Ernest C. Johnston's Oregon educator license.

Furthermore, the Commission imposes a period of three (3) years of probation upon Johnston's licensure and is subject to the following condition:

4	2. Within the first year of probation, Johnston shall complete a Commission
5	approved training on boundaries and submit proof to the Commission of
